Israel steps up strikes on Tehran, Iran defiant

Trump says he ordered US join Israel's ops because he wanted to pre-empt strikes by Iran, expects 'someone from within' regime to be best fit to take over power after conflict

DUBAI: Israel stepped up airstrikes on Iranian missile launchers and factories Tuesday, and Iran retaliated against Israel and across the Gulf region, disrupting energy supplies and travel. As explosions rang out in Tehran and in Lebanon — where Israel said it struck Hezbollah militants — the US embassy in Saudi Arabia came under drone attack.

Four days into a war that President Donald Trump suggested would last several weeks but perhaps longer, hundreds of people have been killed, the vast majority in Iran. Information coming out of Iran has been limited because of poor communications, round-the-clock airstrikes and tight restrictions on journalists.

Trump said he ordered US forces to join Israel's attack on Iran because he believed Iran was about to strike his country, his latest explanation amid conflicting accounts from the administration of how the war started.

"I might have forced their (Israel's) hand," he said in the Oval Office as he met with German Chancellor Friedrich Merz.

"We were having negotiations with these lunatics, and it was my opinion that they were going to attack first. If we didn't do it, they were going to attack first. I felt strongly about that." He also expressed concern that their strikes could lead to a new leadership that is equally troubling to the US.

Iran has fired dozens of ballistic missiles at Israel, setting off air raid sirens across the country. The pace of the attacks appeared to be slowing and Israel has intercepted most of the incoming fire, but some missiles have landed, killing 11 people. On Tuesday, explosions were heard across Doha, Dubai and Abu Dhabi, according to reporters and residents.

US-Israeli strikes caused damage at an airport in Bushehr, a port city in southern Iran that also hosts a nuclear power plant, the Mehr news agency reported.



Iraq slashes output Iraq has cut 116 million barrels per day — almost a third of its output — due to storage limits and the lack of an export route. They said the country may have to shut 3 million bpd, nearly all of its output, within days if exports do not resume.

QatarEnergy LNG halted QatarEnergy LNG halted Qatar's operations at its LNG facilities on Monday, affecting some of the world's largest plants and a source that supplies about 20% of global LNG. QatarEnergy also suspended parts of downstream output on Tuesday.

Saudi disruptions Saudi Arabia, the world's top oil exporter, suspended output at its 550,000 bpd Ras Tanura refinery and has begun rerouting crude loadings from eastern ports to Yanbu on the Red Sea.

Other outages Israel and Iraq's Kurdistan region also curtailed parts of their oil and gas production. There was also a fire caused by debris at the UAE's Fujairah port, a key global oil storage and bunkering hub.

War clouds energy supply, Centre says no shortages

NEW DELHI: The West Asia conflict does not pose any immediate threat to India's energy security, according to people aware of the matter who cited what they said were crude oil and fuel stocks of 25 days each, as the government sought to allay concerns from observers following repeated escalation in hostilities in the Gulf — a region from where close to half of India's crude oil imports come.

Petroleum minister Hardeep Singh Puri said India has sufficient energy reserves to deal with the

ongoing situation and that consumers of petrol, diesel and cooking gas will not immediately face any shortage.

India imports just over five million barrels of crude per day, of which roughly 2.5 million bpd transit the Strait of Hormuz, the 33-kilometre passage between Iran and Oman through which shipping has ground to a near-halt after Iranian retaliatory strikes on the Gulf. Qatar, which is one of the main suppliers of LNG, paused production on Monday.

The ministry said it has set up a 24x7 control room to monitor supply and stock positions. →P8

IAF gets defence board nod to buy 5 S-400s from Russia

NEW DELHI: The Defence Procurement Board (DPB) on Monday cleared the Indian Air Force (IAF) proposal to buy five more S-400 air defence systems from Russia according to people familiar with the matter — a move that comes even as West Asia is seeing a conflict dominated by ballistic missiles and kamikaze drones.

The board, headed by defence secretary Rajesh Kumar Singh, accepted the IAF proposal which will now go to the Defence Acquisition Council (DAC) headed by defence minister Raj-

nath Singh for acceptance of necessity (AoN). Only after the DAC grants AoN will the cost negotiation committee be constituted to fix the price of the new acquisition before the matter is given the final green signal by the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) via the finance ministry.

India currently has three S-400 systems with another two expected to be inducted into the Indian armed forces this year. The S-400 system performed admirably during Operation Sindoor and ensured that Pakistani fighters, airborne warning aircraft and electronic intelligence

NEW YORK: Florida's public university system, one of US's largest, froze hiring via H-1B visas, emulating a move by Texas to restrict a programme that's become a focal point for President Donald Trump's immigration crackdown. Governor Ron DeSantis had ordered the board that oversees Florida's public universities to end the practice last October, claiming varsities were using them to replace US citizens. BJP names 9 for RS polls, Bihar ticket for party prez

NEW DELHI: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Tuesday announced nine candidates for the 2026 biennial elections to the Rajya Sabha across six states, setting the stage for the high-stakes polls later this month. At least three states — Maharashtra, Bihar and Odisha — are likely to see a contest. From Bihar, where five seats are falling vacant, the BJP nominated party chief Nitin

Nabin, and Shivesh Kumar.

In Assam, where three seats go to the polls, the BJP has fielded only two candidates. In Chhattisgarh, where two seats are falling vacant, member of the party's state women commission, Laxmi Verma, has been fielded. In Haryana, Sanjay Bhatia was named as the candidate. In Odisha, where four seats go to polls, the party nominated state unit president Manmohan Samal and outgoing RSM P Sujeet Kumar. →P10

Gaffaney, Palekar to officiate in 2nd semis

DUBAI: New Zealand's Chris Gaffaney and Allahuddin Palekar of South Africa will be the on-field umpires for the T20 World Cup semifinal between India and England in Mumbai on Thursday with Zimbabwean Andy Pycroft as match referee. The ICC on Tuesday announced the match officials of semifinals of the T20 World Cup ahead of the knockout fixtures in Kolkata and Mumbai. Gaffaney also oversaw the proceedings when India and England met at the same stage in the 2024 edition of the tournament. Palekar, on the other hand, stood in two of England's matches in the ongoing tournament as well as India's victory over the Netherlands. Accompanying the trio in Mumbai will be Adrian Holdstock (third umpire), and Paul Reiffel (fourth umpire). The English duo of Richard Illingworth and Alex Wharf will be assuming the role of on-field umpires in the first semifinal between South Africa and New Zealand at the Eden Gardens on Wednesday. The pair will be joined in Kolkata by Nitin Menon as third umpire, while Rod Tucker will take his place as the fourth umpire. Javagal Srinath has been named the match referee for this game.

Pak selector Dar quits after poor show: Report

LAHORE: Senior selection committee member Aleem Dar has tendered his resignation to the PCB in the wake of the national team's poor show in the T20 World Cup, according to sources. "Former ICC elite panel umpire Dar has sent his resignation which is yet to be accepted," a well-informed source close to the PCB said on Tuesday. Dar and former Test players Asad Shafiq and Aaqib Javed are the members of the selection committee. Dar said that he resigned because he was not happy with the undue authority given to the team's head coach Mike Hesson in selection matters. He said Dar was surprised to see that neither captain Salman Agha nor the other selectors resisted Hesson's authority. Pakistan failed to qualify for the semifinals and lost to big teams like arch-foes India and England while their Super Eight game against New Zealand was washed out. They beat Sri Lanka in their final Super Eight game but couldn't qualify for the semifinals. The performance of the players, according to the sources, has not only upset the PCB but also influential figures in the government.

New Zealand, the game's pragmatic problem solvers

NEW DELHI: We find ourselves at the semi-final stage of a cricket World Cup. The final four. Just two matches away from being champions. And once again, among those teams is a familiar name in New Zealand, a country with a population of approximately 5.34 million people where rugby, not cricket, is a national religion.

But think back to any recent ICC World Cup and the Kiwis have played their hand, and played it well. New Zealand now hold the record for the most semi-final appearances in ICC Men's World Cup history, reaching 14 in all (9 in ODIs and 4 in T20Is). India and Australia have the second-best record with 13 semi-finals each.

This tournament has been a bit of a mixed bag though. Rain, some middling performance and the manic nature of T20s have not seen them at their clinical best. But they are here, in with a chance... looking to reset; looking to make an impact as they go up against an unbeaten South Africa in Kolkata on Wednesday. It's a bit like Germany in the football World Cup. Regardless of form, come the big tournament, they just know how to make themselves tough to beat. As Gary Lineker once said, "Football is a simple game; 22 men chase a ball for 90 minutes and at the end, the Germans win."

The wins, despite making it to so many semi-finals, hasn't come along for New Zealand. But while the Germans are renowned for their resilience, the Kiwis, across generations, adopt a pragmatic approach. And always fightback when it appears all is lost.

On most days, New Zealand are about balance. As long as they play their game, the result almost feels secondary. They want to solve the problem in front of them but if they can't, it's fine.

"I think if you look historically at the Black Caps, you would probably say that they're a team that have been great problem solvers, they are street smart, they find a way to solve the conditions quickly," said NZ coach Rob Walter earlier in the tournament.

He added: "It's certainly something we pride ourselves on. And when you are in the subcontinent and there's different soil types on the same block, you are faced with

different conditions all the time. And that's the beauty of the game of cricket, isn't it? It's like nothing's ever the same. And so, we want to keep being a side that responds quickly. We can adapt to conditions quickly and find a method. And that won't change. That won't change throughout."

The core of the NZ philosophy, though, is how they rise above the individual. Cricket is a team sport and they play it like one. As Daryl Mitchell recently told ESPNcricinfo, "That's the cool thing about this New Zealand group: We all are

in it together, constantly having conversations about "how do you do this?" And we keep trying to add little facets to our game. That's one of the main reasons why we've had some success."

The understanding that they don't quite have the same resources as some of the other teams around

means that they have to make the most of what they have. "Individual performance is only a contribution to something greater than yourself and that is the team," former skipper Kane Williamson said in his press conference just after the 2019 ODI World Cup final, which they lost by the thinnest of margins. "The idea is that you are helping your team get across the line and the only thing you can perhaps think of... is what more I could have done."

This is the first and foremost lesson that is passed down to any new member. Everybody is allowed to be themselves and when they all move together, they present a different problem each time. Just as they look for a solution, the opposition must too.

For instance, NZ's highest wicket-taker in this tournament is Rachin Ravindra. His 9 wickets at a strike-rate of 8.6 have offset skipper Mitch Santner taking just 2 wickets at an SR of 60.

When asked about how Ravindra managed this, he said: "I'm not sure if it's anything special. I think most of it is backing what we do and trusting our method... the communication between the spin group helps too."

The greatness of New Zealand is that their collective often finds a way to beat genius, and even when it doesn't, they're content in the idea that they and everyone else watching had some fun.

As Williamson once said: "Laugh or cry, it's your choice, isn't it?"

Mitchell Santner (NZ)

While South Africa topped their Super Eight table, beating India and West Indies en route, Mitchell Santner's New Zealand lost to England and had to rely on Net Run Rate to squeeze ahead of Pakistan and seal their final four spot. A drubbing at the hands of South Africa in the group stage will also weigh on their minds. But the Eden Gardens will provide very different conditions and dew could make bowling second tough.



Aiden Markram (SA)

Markram has led from the front, scoring 86* in a seven-wicket romp over New Zealand in the group phase, easily chasing 176 with 17 balls to spare. But South Africa will have a tough time in adapting to the conditions, especially dew, in Kolkata as they will play outside Delhi and Ahmedabad for the first time in this tournament. The Proteas have been unbeaten so far and will look to make it to the second straight T20 WC final with a win over the cool Kiwis.


KEY MATCHUPS

NZ spinners vs SA batters

The Proteas, with a power-hitting line-up comprising Markram, Quinton de Kock, Dewald Brevis, Ryan Rickleton, Tristan Stubbs, David Miller and Marco Jansen, can give any team a run for their money. So far in this tournament they have looked the team to beat, hardly showing any vulnerability except in the match against Afghanistan. But Santner has quite a few part-time spin options in Rachin Ravindra, Glenn Phillips and Cole McConchie, who have all performed vital roles during the tournament.

NZ batters vs SA pace battery

The batting-friendly pitch at Eden Gardens will allow Finn Allen, Tim Seifert, Glenn Phillips and Daryl Mitchell to think of a 200-plus total that would give them a chance versus the Proteas. Batting second will be far easier though, with dew likely to play a major role this time of the year. SA will be better off in this aspect as their pace battery of Kagiso Rabada, Marco Jansen, Lungi Ngidi and Corbin Bosch are seasoned to deal with the dew. It will be interesting to see how effective Ngidi's slower deliveries will be on this track.

KEY MATCHUPS

England openers vs India bowlers

Jos Buttler is averaging just 8.85 in the competition after five successive single-figure scores while Phil Salt's only knock of note was a 62 in the Super 8s against Sri Lanka. Brook though is confident his opening pair can fire versus India, a side England are meeting for the third straight T20 World Cup semi-final, having hammered them in Adelaide in 2022 before being thrashed by them in Guyana in 2024. India's new-ball bowlers Arshdeep Singh and Hardik Pandya have not been exceptional, unlike Jasprit Bumrah, but they haven't been all over the place either.

Jofra Archer and Will Jacks vs India openers

Sanju Samson getting runs in the semi win over Windies will somewhat ally fears over off-spinner Will Jacks' threat, but Jofra Archer has dismissed the opener thrice in five T20Is. Abhishek Sharma has remained vulnerable against off-spin. Jacks has been instrumental for England, contributing 191 runs at No 7, including in the nerve-jangling wins over Nepal, Italy, Sri Lanka and New Zealand, and taking 7 wickets with his off-spin.



Suryakumar Yadav (IND)

India have shown vulnerability on many fronts but someone or the other has stood up and delivered when it mattered. Opener Abhishek Sharma though remains the biggest concern in the batting line-up as he searches for form while mystery spinner Varun Chakravarthy being walloped for runs in three matches on the trot will add to the concerns of the India skipper on a usually good Wankhede track.



Harry Brook (ENG)

Brook's side stuttered to wins over Associate nations Nepal, Scotland and Italy in the first round around and lost meekly to West Indies. They improved in the Super 8s beating Sri Lanka, Pakistan — the skipper hit a stunning 50-ball century — and then finally New Zealand, having looked up against it needing 43 from the final 18 deliveries. That is what India will be wary of, letting England chase a target.




It's a Gambhir-McCullum face-off too

NEW DELHI: It is in the Twenty20 format that a cricket coach comes closest to their touchline-prowling counterpart in football. Cricket's stop-start nature, though, allows for instructions to be passed on without constant shouting and gesturing. When things get nifty, TV cameras pan on the cricket coach as much as they do in football.

Come Thursday, when defending champions India go up against England, two of the most high-profile coaches in this T20 World Cup will match wits at the Wankhede Stadium. While home fans will hope the roles are reversed — recalling another semi-final at the venue 39 years ago when England won that 1987 ODI World Cup clash — Gautam Gambhir and Brendon McCullum will be doubly determined to ace this intense contest.

Both former international openers of distinction, the coaching careers of the 44-year-olds have taken a largely similar path. Both have strong links to Kolkata Knight Riders in the Indian Premier League. McCullum's sensational 158 for KKR against Royal Challengers Bangalore (now Ben-

galuru) lit up the inaugural game of the first edition. Gambhir captained the team to its first two titles (2012, 2014), and was a prolific run-getter in both campaigns.

Both gave back to KKR after their playing days. Gambhir returned as team mentor to guide them to a third title in 2024 before succeeding Rahul Dravid as India chief coach. McCullum took the team to the IPL final in 2021, their first since 2014, before leaving the next year to take over as England chief coach.

The former New Zealand skipper's push to get the team to iden-



tify with his philosophy of all-out aggression with the bat marked his tenure with KKR. McCullum wasn't one for batters building an innings, or worry about losing their wicket. His bid to carry that thrill-a-ball cricket lit up English cricket after he took over and joined forces with Ben Stokes, the games and audacious run chases bringing in the fans in droves.

However, the inability to beat an Indian team in transition last summer and then capitulating 1-4 in the Ashes series in Australia has left pundits and the media calling for the sacking. His comment after the pink-ball Test

defeat in Brisbane that his players actually did too much heavy training in the run-up didn't win admirers and reports of heavy drinking by the players during their mid-Ashes break in Noosa raised more questions. The revelation that Harry Brook was punched by a bouncer in Auckland added to the demand for his ouster.

This T20 World Cup campaign thus could not have come sooner. McCullum has both backed white-ball skipper Brook, one of the game's top batters, and demanded that criticism of the players should be toned down as

it helped no one. Brook repaid the support with a match-winning 50-ball century against Pakistan and then announced his promotion to No.3 was "All Baz".

His "express yourself" approach in Test cricket seems to have tapered off, especially after the Ashes debacle, but it seems to be helping England find belief in their white-ball game, especially after the 2023 ODI World Cup flop show in India. McCullum showed his seemingly cavalier coaching philosophy contained some winning psychology too when he asked young Rehan Ahmed to "bat like Sehwag", referring to India's Sultan of free-swinging batsmanship. With 43 to get from 18 balls against New Zealand, Rehan swung the second ball from Glenn Phillips out of the park, igniting the finish with serial-player of the match Will Jacks.

Gambhir is on the other end of the spectrum but will surely sympathise with McCullum's Test travels. His first series, at home, was a 0-3 drubbing in Australia against New Zealand. An Australia tour loss followed by the Test retirements of Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma from Tests, and not pushing for victory in the England series (it ended 2-2) despite a surprisingly robust show by his

young team by not playing left-arm wrist spinner Kuldeep Yadav at all, raised questions if red-ball was his forte. Then followed the 0-2 loss to South Africa, although losing in-form skipper Shubman Gill to a neck injury was a huge setback.

A combative character, Gambhir initially brushed aside doubts if three left-handers at the top would fail the match-up test of T20. However, acknowledging the issue after off-spinners made early in-roads was rewarded with Sanju Samson finally finding form with a match-winning 97 in the virtual quarter-final against West Indies.

Gambhir is in control of the team and has BCCI's backing. Unlike McCullum, who wants his players to enjoy their cricket, Gambhir insists that his players put the team first and go to battle for the country. Like McCullum though, his contract too runs until 2027, although the England coach appears to be on a sticky wicket after the Ashes loss.

No team has successfully defended the T20 World Cup title. But Gambhir will be expected to outsmart a familiar adversary and give India the chance to make amends for their 2023 ODI World Cup final loss at home.

Special flights from Gulf land in Capital, fliers recount ordeal

NEW DELHI: For Madhuri Dwiwedi, who managed to escape conflict-hit Dubai, United Arab Emirates, on flight through Oman's capital Muscat to reach Delhi, the past 72 hours have been so chaotic that she forgot to inform her daughters' teachers that they would not be able to attend online classes on Tuesday.

"On Sunday, I received a message from my daughters' school that classes would be online on March 2 and 3, and would continue unless tensions in the Gulf improved. We reached Muscat yesterday, so my daughters attended their classes. As we were uncertain about our travel plans to India and only secured tickets this morning, I completely forgot to inform their teachers," said Dwiwedi, who returned to India along with her husband and two daughters, both below the age of three. The family has been settled in Dubai for the past six years.

While Dwiwedi travelled through Muscat, others secured special flights from Dubai to India. The third special flight carrying around 150 Indians from Dubai landed at Terminal 3 of Indira Gandhi International Airport at around 12.50pm on Tuesday.

The special flights came even as operations at Delhi air-

port remained impacted for the fourth consecutive day due to airspace restrictions amid the escalating conflict in West Asia.

As of Tuesday, four special flights — one on Monday evening and three on Tuesday — had reached Delhi, carrying over 1,100 Indians from Dubai. Though limited flights have resumed from airports in the West Asia, at least 80 flights to and from Delhi were cancelled on Tuesday. Additionally, over 200 flights, including domestic services, were delayed.

"Of the 80 cancelled flights, 36 were departures and 44 arrivals. The situation has started improving as two flights from Dubai landed on

Tuesday," an airport official said.

According to FlightRadar24, a flight-tracking website, more than 200 flights were delayed until Tuesday evening, with an average delay of 15 minutes.

At least 87 flights were cancelled on Monday and 104 on Sunday.

Delhi airport wrote on X: "Given the changing geopolitical situation in [West Asia], some westbound international flights may be subject to delays or operational adjustments."

It asked passengers to check the latest updates with their respective airlines before travelling to the airport and, if necessary, consider alternate routes or connections sug-

gested by the airline. Airport officials said additional help desks were set up in the international security holding area and departure forecourt, and quick reaction teams were deployed across check-in, boarding, arrival, transfer, and ticketing areas.

"Advisories are being issued on social media platforms in real time. Airport staff are also distributing water bottles, tea, and refreshments via mobile food kiosks," the official quoted above said, adding that hot meals and hygiene kits are also being provided.

"Further, additional recliners and medical teams have been made available. Over 3,000 bags belonging to pas-

sengers whose flights were cancelled have been returned so far," the official added.

For four-year-old Shamik Vahishta and his parents Arvind (35) and Deepa (34), the end of their week-long vacation to Dubai was nothing short of dramatic, said Arvind.

"We were supposed to return on February 28, but our flight was cancelled at the last minute. At first, we planned to wait at the airport for the next available flight, but after receiving alerts and announcements to stay indoors, we decided it was safer to move to a hotel," said Noida-based Arvind.

"We're truly grateful to Air India. It felt like a covert evacuation. Around 10pm on Monday, we received a call and message about a morning flight, though they said it was still a 50-50 chance. We told them we were ready to take the risk," he added.

Repeated announcements and non-stop sirens were unsettling, said 34-year-old Hardik Doshi, describing the scene at Abu Dhabi airport early Tuesday.

"I went on a company-sponsored leisure trip last Wednesday and was scheduled to return on March 1. Around 400 employees from different departments were on the trip. After the cancellations, we were all split up. No one knows how many have returned or are still stuck at a hotel in Dubai," said Mumbai-based Doshi.

No dry day on Holi: Liquor vends to stay open today

NEW DELHI: Liquor vends in Delhi will remain open today as Holi is not on the list of dry days that will be observed this year, said officials.

In an order issued in January this year, the excise department directed that liquor vends and licensed premises shall observe dry days on select occasions in January, February and March this year under Rule 52 of the Delhi Excise Rules, 2010.

According to the order, January 26 (Republic Day), February 15 (Maha Shivratri), March 21 (Id-ul-Fitr), March 26 (Ram Navami) and March 31 (Mahavir Jayanti) were on the list of dry days this year from January to March.

All licensees were instructed to display the order at a conspicuous place on their premises.

In 2021, the then Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government had slashed the number of dry days to three under the new excise policy, which was later scrapped in July 2022.

Meanwhile, AAP leaders criticised the Rekha Gupta led government on the matter.

Senior AAP leader and former deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia posted on X saying, "The real liquor scam in Delhi has now begun. By keeping liquor shops open even on Holi, the Delhi government has given open permission to earn crores of rupees on a festival day. Does even a single ED or CBI officer have the courage to ask questions about this scam?"

AAP Delhi chief Saurabh Bharadwaj shared the Delhi government's order on X and said, "You may recall how the BJP-led central government created

chaos in Delhi in the name of liquor. They lied at every step to defame the AAP government and trapped us in false cases. But now during the BJP government, in the name of liquor, their true values have come before everyone. They are neither Sanatanis nor patriots. They are merely an uneducated group hungry for power."

Bharadwaj said that so far, the government kept all liquor shops open on Chhath Mahaparv, Ravidas Jayanti, and now on Holi as well. "Is it not CM Rekha Gupta's responsibility to protect our daughters from the hooliganism and obscenity that will occur on the streets after people consume alcohol?" he questioned.

HT reached out to the Delhi government for a comment on the matter, but no response was received by the time of going to print.

Uttam Nagar: Man mowed down by bus after falling off his scooter

NEW DELHI: A 30-year-old man died after he fell off his scooter and was run over by a bus near Uttam Nagar West Metro station in southwest Delhi on Tuesday morning, said police, adding that the scooter hit the door of a stationary car that was opened suddenly by its occupant.

Police identified the deceased as Daksh (single name), a resident of Uttam Nagar. The accident happened around 8.30am when he was returning home after dropping a relative at the metro station.

Deputy commissioner of police (DCP) (Dwarka) Ankit Singh said that at 8.40 am, the police control room received a call regarding the accident.

Locals and passersby told

police that three vehicles — a bus, a Toyota Etios car and a scooter — were involved in the crash. The car bearing Delhi's registration number stopped on the left side of the road on the request of a passenger, who was feeling unwell, police said after speaking to the car driver.

"As the passenger opened the car's right rear side door, a scooter coming from behind crashed into the opened door as its rider did not get enough time to apply brakes. As a result, the

scooter rider lost balance and he fell off of the two-wheeler. At the same time, a DTC bus coming from behind ran over the scooter rider, killing him on the spot," said DCP Singh.

Police said that the bus was plying on route number 887 from Ghumanhera village to Tilak Nagar, when the accident took place. The deceased's body was shifted to Deen Dayal Upadhyay (DDU) hospital's mortuary for autopsy, the police said.

DCP Singh said that a case of rash driving and death by negligence was registered under sections 281 and 106 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) at the Uttam Nagar police station.

However, the police did not specify against whom was the case registered.

DTC did not respond to HT's request for a comment on the incident.

70 Delhi Police officers shifted in major reshuffle

NEW DELHI: A major reshuffle took place in the Delhi Police on Tuesday as the government ordered the transfer and posting of at least 70 officers, police said.

The order, issued with the lieutenant governor's approval on Tuesday, mandated changes at levels of special commissioners, joint commissioners, additional commissioners, deputy commissioners of police and additional DCPs.

According to the order, seen by HT, the reshuffle included transferring senior Indian Police Service (IPS) officers Virender Singh to DG (Home Guards), Anand Mohan to DG (Prisons) and Surendra Singh Yadav to DG (Civil Defence).

Among senior-level changes, IPS officer Sanjay Kumar Jain was posted as officer on special duty (OSD) to the commissioner of police, with the additional charge of joint commissioner of police (tech and PI). Joint commissioner of police (traffic) Kime Kamjng was appointed as joint CP (armed police).

IPS officer Dheeraj Kumar moves from joint CP (armed police) to joint CP (crime), heading the Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF). Ajit Kumar Singh was posted as joint CP (eastern range) and Sanjay Kumar Tyagi takes over as joint CP (traffic).

IPS officer Vijay Kumar (2007 batch), who was OSD to the commissioner, is now joint CP (southern range).

2009 batch officer Monika Bhardwaj shifted from traffic to additional CP (IFSO), while officer Vijayanta Arya was posted as additional CP (traffic). Satya Vir Katara was given charge of additional CP (recruitment) and Nidhin Valsan moves to additional CP (tech and PI).

District-level changes include Sachin Sharma, who was serving as DCP (outer) will take charge as DCP (New Delhi), while DCP (traffic) Shank Jaiswal was moved to DCP (Rohini). Rajiv Kumar was posted as DCP (east) and Kushal Pal Singh as DCP (Dwarka).

Rajendra Prasad Meena was posted as DCP (Shahdara) while Akanksha Yadav was transferred as DCP (north-west).

Vikram Singh was posted as DCP (outer) and Anant Mittal as DCP (south). Rohit Rajbir Singh has taken over as DCP (central).

Ankit Chauhan, who was serving as DCP (south), was posted as DCP (special branch) and Ankit Kumar Singh, who was DCP (Dwarka), was given the post of DCP (vigilance).

In the DANIPS cadre, multiple ACPs have been assigned additional DCP responsibilities in current duty-charge arrangements.

RIVAL GANGSTER HELD FOR FIRING AT CAR CARRYING BISHNOI'S LAWYER

NEW DELHI: A week after several rounds of bullets were fired at a car in north Delhi's Kashmere Gate in which Lawrence Bishnoi's lawyer was travelling, the Delhi Police on Tuesday said they have arrested the key conspirator who was also the assailant.

Police said Rohit Godara and Goldy Brar gangs had planned to kill advocate Deepak Khatri, 45, who has been representing Bishnoi in a few cases.

The accused, Rohit Solanki, 26, is an associate of the Rohit Godara gang and targeted Khatri over the recent gang rivalry and differences.

According to police, when Khatri was returning from a temple with his friends Rishab Kapoor, Vikas Sharma, Umesh and Sandeep in a car around 10pm on February 24, the accused Solanki fired at the car, and Sandeep suffered bullet injuries on his shoulder.

"The team analysed more than 300 CCTVs and found a few suspects roaming around. The images were matched with active members of the different gangs operating in Delhi-NCR. The probe led to the identification of Solanki, a resident of Pooth village, northwest Delhi," DCP (north) Raja Banthia said on Tuesday.

"He was nabbed on Monday from his friend's house in Majra Dabas village in northwest Delhi," said the officer.

Police said the accused had earlier attempted to kill Khatri in Dehradun but failed.

Nearly 4,000 'pink cards' issued on first day of rollout

NEW DELHI: The Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) on Tuesday began issuing smart cards to women commuters, replacing the existing pink paper tickets used to avail free bus rides. DTC said it issued nearly 4,000 cards across various centres on the first day of the roll-out till 5 pm.

A spot check by HT at several DTC pink card centres found that the process of issuing the new QR code-based cards was largely smooth, with roughly 40-45 cards issued at each centre during the day. Officials added that a bigger rush is expected from Thursday after the Holi celebrations.

DTC officials said the smart card system has been introduced to streamline the free travel scheme for women and reduce reliance on paper tickets, while maintaining a digital record of the number of trips taken. The QR-based PVC card is expected to be more durable than the paper slips and can be used across all NCMC-compliant platforms.

Officials added that the smart card will gradually replace the pink paper slips currently issued to women passengers for free travel on Delhi government buses. However, no fixed date has been announced for discontinuing the paper slips.

At the counters, applicants were required to provide basic identification details. Officials

recorded the commuter's name, Aadhaar number, and mobile phone number before issuing the card.

"The process is fairly simple. We note down the commuter's name, Aadhaar number and phone number, and take a photo of the Aadhaar card. Then the card number is recorded against the applicant before handing over the QR-based card," said a DTC official posted at one of the distribution centres.

Commuters who received the card on Tuesday said the system was quicker than expected.

Yogita Gupta, a college student who applied for the card at a DTC centre in south-east Delhi, said, "They only asked for my Aadhaar and phone number. I went to get the card on Tuesday because the crowd would increase after Holi, but the process is not time-consuming."

₹69.6L AWARDED TO 2021 CRASH VICTIM'S FAMILY

NEW DELHI: A Delhi Motor Accident Claims Tribunal (MACT) has awarded ₹69.61 lakh compensation to the family of a 54-year-old army personnel who died in a road collision in 2021.

Presiding Officer Anjani Mahajan was hearing the claim petition filed by the wife and four children of the deceased army personnel, Bal Kishan. On the afternoon of October 29, 2021, Bal Kishan was going to Sihol Palwal from Andhop Palwal on his motorcycle.

Around the time he reached near Kidwari in Chandhul, his motorcycle was struck by a negligently driven truck due to which he fell down and sustained fatal injuries. He was taken to Civil Hospital, Palwal, where was declared brought dead.

3k traffic personnel to check Holi violations on city roads

NEW DELHI: The Delhi Traffic Police on Tuesday said that if a motorist is caught committing traffic violations such as drunken driving, red light jumping and over-speeding during Holi celebrations on Wednesday, the driving licence will be seized and the motorist will be liable for a minimum three months of suspension. Nearly 3,000 traffic personnel will keep a strict vigil across the Capital on Holi.

Special focus will be on vehicles driven by minors, and action

will also be taken against the registered owners of those vehicles, said additional commissioner of police (traffic) Dinesh Kumar Gupta.

"As per the directions of the Supreme Court Committee on Road Safety, in cases of drunken driving, red light jumping, using a mobile phone while driving, dangerous driving, and over-speeding, the driving license will also be seized and liable for suspension for a minimum period of 3 months," said Gupta.

Traffic personnel will be deployed at 134 major intersections in the city, while 79 teams

equipped with alcoholometers will assist security personnel at special integrated police pickets to nab revellers creating a nuisance on roads or disturbing the city's law and order, he added.

"We urge the public to obey traffic rules and not drive after consuming alcohol. Motorists should also observe the prescribed speed limits, obey traffic signals, and not be involved in racing or competition with other vehicles. Two-wheeler riders and pillion riders should wear helmets and avoid triple riding and performing stunts," said Gupta.

280 HELD IN DRIVE TO CHECK ILLEGAL ACTIVITIES ON HOLI

NEW DELHI: Nearly 5,000 people were apprehended and 280 arrested by the Delhi Police as part of a two-day crackdown against habitual offenders, bootleggers, drug peddlers, and other miscreants in southern parts of Delhi. "Operation Aaghat" was launched to prevent illegal activities during Holi celebrations, senior police officers said on Tuesday.

Nearly 2,500 police personnel from south districts carried out special area checks and drives on March 1 and 2.

Okhla landfill sewage damaging key road, PWD writes to MCD

NEW DELHI: The Public Works Department (PWD) has said the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD)'s poor management at the Okhla landfill site and frequent overflow from its drains are causing repeated damage to the arterial road Ma Anandmayee Marg in south-east Delhi, which connects the Outer Ring Road near Kalkaji to the Mehrauli-Badarpur (MB) Road.

The agency has written multiple letters to the civic body stating that sewage overflow mixed with silt from the Okhla landfill is causing damage to the road and creating "unsafe driving conditions" for motorists.

The road is also plagued by the heavy movement of MCD trucks carrying garbage and the stray cattle menace. Commuters say the stretch remains a traffic nightmare, especially during peak hours.

Ramanjot Sethi, a commuter travelling towards Nehru Place from MB Road, said, "The damaged road, unauthorised car and truck repairs, trucks parked on the carriage, thick dust in the air, and most of all hordes of cows near Govindpuri and the Okhla industrial area — this arterial stretch shows failure at every level. Are they waiting for accidents to happen?" he said.

A parallel artery to NH-19 connecting Okhla-Sukhdev Vihar to Tughlaqabad, Ma Anandmayee Marg caters to commuters passing through Kalkaji, Govindpuri, Tughlaqabad, Okhla and nearby areas towards Faridabad.

The road also handles hundreds of vehicles and trucks carrying municipal waste from south Delhi to the Okhla landfill and Tehkhand waste-to-energy plant.

One of the letters from PWD (subdivision SER-1) to the MCD executive engineer said multiple communications have been sent, through which "the issue of outflow of dirty water mixed with silt from SLF Okhla site on Maa Anandmayee Marg has been brought to their notice".

"However, the problem still persists and no remedial action has been taken at site. Due to continuous discharge, the nearby drain is repeatedly getting choked despite regular cleaning, resulting in deposition of silt and water on the carriage-way. This is creating unsafe driving conditions and causing further deterioration of the road," the letter adds. PWD has asked the MCD to identify the root cause and ensure permanent rectification of the problem.

MCD officials did not respond to queries on the matter. PWD had undertaken a traffic volume survey of Ma Anandmayee Marg, which revealed that the road has a traffic volume exceeding 10,000 PCU (passenger car units) per hour, which rises further during peak hours.

Earlier, HT had reported that leakages from a nearby reservoir were also damaging Ma Anandmayee Marg. PWD had written to the Delhi Jal Board in December and January, urging it to address the leakage source and compensate PWD for recurring repair work on the road.

"Due to constant leakage of water from the Delhi Jal Board facility near ESI Hospital, the Ma Anandmayee Marg maintained by the Public Works Department is getting damaged... We are once again requesting you to take steps to plug the leakage source. Otherwise, the Delhi Jal Board will have to bear the expenses for carrying out repair work on the damaged road," the note said.

The issue, the DJB said, has since been rectified.

{ 'PHANSI GHAR' ROW }

Kejriwal: Will appear before panel on Mar 6

NEW DELHI: Former Delhi chief minister Arvind Kejriwal on Tuesday said he will appear before the Delhi Assembly's privileges committee on March 6 in connection with the "Phansi Ghar" controversy and demanded that the proceedings be live-streamed.

The Aam Aadmi Party's (AAP) national convener on Tuesday posted on X saying, "Delhi is grappling with pollution, roads are broken, there are heaps of garbage everywhere, hospitals are facing a shortage of medicines, and the Delhi Assembly has called me to answer questions on a 'phansi ghar'."

Kejriwal, in the letter to the committee (a copy of which he shared on X), said he received the summons issued to him on February 18 under Rules 172 and 220 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the Delhi Legislative Assembly.

He said he will appear before the committee on March 6 at 3pm. "My appearance is without prejudice to my legal and constitutional rights, remedies, objections and contentions, all of

which are expressly reserved. In the interest of transparency and public accountability, I request that the proceedings of the Committee in the present matter be live-streamed," read the communication from Kejriwal.

The issue refers to "Phansi Ghar" (gallows chamber), a room that the AAP government publicly showcased in August 2022 as a historical execution chamber on the assembly premises.

It became a political flashpoint after last year, when Speaker Vijender Gupta showed maps and shared other details, claiming it was a lift chamber used for transporting tiffins, not an execution room.

The development follows proceedings of the Delhi assembly in January this year, when the house adopted the first report of the Committee of Privileges after a motion was moved, agreeing with the report presented on January 6, 2026.

The report recorded that the absence of the AAP leaders mentioned from committee sittings on November 13 and November 20, 2025, remained unexplained despite repeated communications being sent to them.

RESIDENTS TOLD TO LEAVE 'UNSAFE' PALLIKA DHAM UNITS BY MARCH 7

NEW DELHI: Issuing another public notice on Tuesday, the New Delhi Municipal Council (NDMC) asked Palika Dham residents to vacate the buildings that were deemed "unsafe and dangerous" by March 7.

Last July, NDMC declared the building complex "dangerous" due to its dilapidated condition. It has since issued multiple notices asking residents to vacate, but they are hesitant to do so.

The Palika Dham complex, which has 150 Type-1 quarters, houses around 800 residents.

"The complex is structurally unsafe. To prevent accidents, residents were asked to vacate," an NDMC official said.

Raju Dholakia, president of the permanent RWA, said they are in touch with local representatives. "We have been assured that no action will be taken against us. Other buildings in the NDMC area are older than our complex, but NDMC insist on demolition instead of repairing the complex."

To be sure, these buildings were not repaired since the 1970s, when they were built. The tiles are broken, iron rods are visible in places and plaster keeps falling off.

Ggm police auction accused's vehicle to compensate victim

GURUGRAM: A car purchased by a rape accused was attached and auctioned by police for ₹11.3 lakh to compensate the amount that he allegedly extorted from the victim, police said on Tuesday. Investigators said Section 107 (attachment, forfeiture or restoration of property suspected to be proceeds of crime) of Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) was invoked in the case for the first time in the country to compensate a victim.

Police said the 34-year-old victim, working at a multinational firm, had alleged that the man, from Rajasthan's Jaipur, had raped her last year on the pretext marriage and shared her compromising photographs with his friends.

He also took ₹24 lakh and gold jewellery from her, claiming he needed it to start a business, but, instead, he used it to purchase a car in his mother's name and repay a loan taken by his younger brother. The victim alleged the accused gave the

jewellery to his mother.

On her complaint, an FIR was registered against him under sections 69 (sexual intercourse by employing deceitful means), 77 (voyeurism), 308(2) (extortion) and 351(2) (criminal intimidation) of Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and the Information Technology Act at Sector-10 police station on January 2.

Police said the accused, a photographer by profession, was arrested on January 4 and is still in judicial custody.

Inspector Kuldeep Singh, station house officer of Sector-10 police station, said that on January 11, police moved the court seeking to attach the car as the proceeds of crime.

"The order approving the attachment of the car, a Volkswagen Virtus, was passed on January 21," he said.

Police then fixed a base price for the vehicle based on a quote from the transport department and handed the ₹11.30 lakh over to the victim on Friday after auctioning the car through eAuction India, a central government portal, on February 25.

Delhi temperatures to rise further, says IMD

NEW DELHI: Temperatures in the Capital are set to climb once again after a brief spell of relief brought by cool northwesterly winds, with the India Meteorological Department (IMD) forecasting a steady rise through the week.

The maximum is expected to touch 34°C on Wednesday, rise to 35°C Thursday, and reach around 36°C by Sunday.

Meteorologists attribute the warming to a shift in wind direction and the absence of western disturbances over north India.

At Safdarjung, Delhi's base observatory, the maximum temperature on Tuesday was recorded at 31.5°C — four degrees above normal and slightly higher than Monday's

30.9°C. IMD officials said the region has not witnessed any significant western disturbance since late January. "February only experienced weak weather activity, which failed to bring meaningful rainfall," an official said.

Mahesh Palawat, vice-president at Skymet Weather, said the changing wind pattern is now driving the temperature rise. "Colder northwesterlies have given way to dry westerlies from Rajasthan and Pakistan. These winds contribute to a gradual increase in daytime temperatures," he said.

Meanwhile, Delhi's air quality deteriorated, with the AQI rising to 216 on Tuesday, placing it in the "poor" category.

Dry winds carrying coarse dust have contributed to a spike in PM10 levels.

Second suspect also killed in exchange of fire with Gzb cops

GHAZIABAD: The second suspect in last week's stabbing of YouTuber Saleem Wastik in Ghaziabad was killed in an exchange of fire with police late Tuesday, officials said. The development comes two days after his younger brother, identified earlier as the first accused in the case, was also killed in a similar encounter.

Wastik was allegedly attacked around on February 27 at his office-cum-residence in Ali Garden, Loni. Two men, who were unidentified at the time, allegedly stabbed him and fled on a motorcycle. He remains critical at a Delhi hospital, according to his son, Usman Ahmad.

Police said the first suspect, Zeeshan Ali, was tracked down on Sunday. He was allegedly riding a motorcycle with another man, later identified as Gulfam. Officers said the duo opened fire when a police team attempted to stop them. Zeeshan was killed in retaliatory firing, while Gulfam escaped. Both were residents of Khoda in Ghaziabad.

On Tuesday, police said Gulfam was located beneath the Hindon elevated road near Khoda following specific inputs. According to Piyush Kumar Singh, additional deputy commissioner of police (crime), he was again riding a KTM motorcycle with an unidentified associate when officers intercepted him. "The team asked them to

stop, but they opened fire. Police retaliated. The suspect sustained bullet injuries and was taken to hospital," Singh said. The second rider fled. Gulfam died during treatment at a private hospital in Indrapuram, said Nimish Patil, DCP (Trans-Hindon zone).

Investigators said evidence, including CCTV footage showing the two men fleeing on a motorcycle with bloodstained clothes, had established their involvement in Wastik's attack.

An FIR filed by Wastik's son named two unidentified bikers and three others, including a political functionary and a builder. Police said no evidence has yet emerged linking those named individuals to the attack, and further probe is ongoing.

Froth at Wazirabad raises alarm about Yamuna pollution

NEW DELHI: Toxic froth and an ammoniacal stench at the Wazirabad barrage, a crucial drinking water source for Delhi, have triggered fresh concerns about pollution levels in the Yamuna, with activists warning that contamination may now be creeping into upstream stretches of the river, once considered relatively cleaner.

Typically, visuals of toxic foam on the river surface are observed downstream at Kalindi Kunj near the Okhla barrage, after 22 major drains add to the pollution load. The water quality at Wazirabad is generally considered relatively better, and the city draws raw water from the Wazirabad pondage area to feed two of its water treatment plants. Activists have expressed concern after recent photographs showed frothing.

Yamuna activist Pankaj Kumar posted visuals on X, tagging government functionaries, and wrote: "Normally, the stretch downstream of Wazirabad does not have this kind of visible toxic froth. This same water is being treated and supplied to the people of Delhi. What is the reason for this froth in the upstream sections?"

The Yamuna enters Delhi near Palla and flows 48km through the national capital before exiting at Asgarpur. This includes the 22km stretch from Wazirabad to Okhla, which is the

most polluted segment, as 22 major drains empty into it.

Yamuna water quality reports from November and December indicate undesirable levels of faecal coliform, phosphate and ammoniacal nitrogen, along with deteriorating biochemical oxygen demand (BOD) and chemical oxygen demand (COD) levels, which are key indicators of organic pollution and overall river health.

Bhim Singh Rawat, a Yamuna activist and member of the South Asia Network on Dams, Rivers and People (SANDRP), said, "The city draws its drinking water from there. There should be no phosphate or pollutant load at this point, but the situation is deteriorating."

During a spot check on Tuesday, HT saw froth in the water flowing through the barrage. An ammoniacal stench was also noticeable near Sur Ghat, adjacent to the barrage.

Kumar suggested the source could lie in Haryana, where industrial activity continues.

In November, the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMC), in an affidavit before the National Green Tribunal (NGT), said instructions had been issued to Haryana to cover drain number six. The affidavit came after the NGT took suo motu cognisance of a media report in July 2024 highlighting thousands of fish deaths in the Yamuna.

No comment was received by the Delhi government by the time of going to print.

Survey reveals massive silt build-up in Najafgarh drain

NEW DELHI: Buried beneath layers of sludge and neglect, the Najafgarh drain, once the Sahibi river, has emerged as a critical fault line in Delhi's flood control and pollution management system.

A government-commissioned bathymetric survey has found that over 150 sub-drains from Delhi and Gurugram empty into the 57km channel, while nearly 9.1 million cubic metres of silt have accumulated on its bed.

Officials say the findings have laid bare the scale of deterioration and are now guiding an ambitious clean-up under "Mission Sahibi".

A senior official from the Irrigation and Flood Control (I&FC) department said they have begun desilting heavily clogged stretches on priority. "The objective is to ensure unobstructed flow of rainwater and reduce the risk of waterlogging. Additionally, drain banks are being upgraded and

strengthened, enhancing structural stability. This campaign runs for over 13 hours daily and involves the use of amphibious excavators," the official said. The project is aimed at reducing waterlogging in catchment areas such as Dwarka, Matiala, Palam, Uttam Nagar, Mundka, Janakpuri and Vikaspuri. The immediate focus is the stretch between Ambrahi Bridge and Kakrola Village Bridge. Offi-

cialists said embankments are also being strengthened.

The Najafgarh drain contributes nearly 70% of the wastewater entering the Yamuna in Delhi, making its restoration central to the larger river rejuvenation effort. "Overall, the Najafgarh drain is 57.14km long and has a complex system of 150 big and small drains originating in Gurugram and Delhi. We are using 32 advanced

machines for the desilting work, which will restore the original water-carrying capacity of the drain," the official said.

Earlier interventions focused primarily on 32 major feeder drains and 74 smaller sub-drains, while the main channel continued to choke.

On July 11, Union home minister Amit Shah chaired a review meeting on the Yamuna and directed that drone surveys be conducted of the Najafgarh and Shahdara drains. He stressed the need to double Delhi's sewage treatment capacity to 1,500 MGD (million gallons per day) by 2028 as part of a multipronged strategy to rejuvenate the Yamuna.

Bhim Singh Rawat, a Yamuna activist and member of the South Asia Network on Dams, Rivers and People (SANDRP), said, "Delhi's overall sewage generation estimates are also faulty as we do not factor in the groundwater being used by people in the sewage output. This could be a massive chunk."

GOVT TO DEVELOP E-CATALOGUE FOR ARTISANS TO SHOW THEIR WORK

NEW DELHI: The Delhi government will develop an e-catalogue for artisans to ensure visibility for their products in national and international markets, officials said on Tuesday.

Under the CM Skill Development Scheme, the Delhi Khadi Village Industries Board (DKVIB) will provide training to artisans by partnering with multiple organisations empanelled with the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC).

"Each artisan will have an e-catalogue created with their profile, photographs, and product details. These will be uploaded on the Open Network for Digital Commerce (ONDC) platform, giving their products visibility," added an official, adding that artisans registered on the e-Shram portal shall avail the scheme's benefits. **HTC**

Special cell to investigate death threats to defence entrepreneur

NEW DELHI: The Delhi Police commissioner last week directed the special cell to probe the death threats made to an entrepreneur in central Delhi over the past few months.

Three bike-borne assailants also fired a bullet outside his house in Amritsar, Punjab, in November last year. A CCTV footage of the incident shows the men sticking a note on the residence's gate and then making a video before opening fire.

According to police, Sahil Luthra, managing director of Vijayan Trishul Defence Solutions Pvt Ltd (VTDS) in central Delhi's Barakhamba Road, filed a complaint in May last year alleging that unknown persons tried to hack into the company's

official email IDs and social media handles. However, Luthra filed a fresh complaint on Friday alleging he has been receiving death threats from multiple international numbers. After these threats, the special cell is now investigating the case.

Luthra told police he received calls on Thursday from numbers in Portugal and Germany. "The callers claimed responsibility for the firing in Amritsar and also warned him of further action. The callers said they belong to an international network and demanded ₹10 crore," said a senior police officer.

The callers allegedly claimed to be from the Babar Khalsa International and Goldy Brar alliance. "We are probing who is making the calls. We are also looking into the recent threats issued to Bollywood actors and

directors," the officer said.

Luthra, in the complaint, stated, "The nature of these threats has now escalated, they are directly stating that I will be shot and killed. I am deeply disturbed...living under constant anxiety and fear for my family members' lives...They (callers) have also stated that they are aware I have security protection..." In an email response dated Friday, accessed by HT, the Delhi Police commissioner's office confirmed that they have taken cognisance of the complaint. "Your email has been acknowledged by the Commissioner of Police, Delhi and the same has been referred to the Special Commissioner of Police/Special Cell..."

Police said Amritsar Police are also looking into the allegations and the firing incident.

[ASSAULT OF GANGSTER AT TIHAR]

Murder charges framed against 6 former officials

NEW DELHI: A Delhi court has framed murder charges against six former Tihar Jail officials, including Narendra Meena, the then deputy superintendent of jail, on the alleged brutal assault and murder of gangster Ankit Gujjar inside the jail in August 2021 for "failing to yield to their extortion demands".

The city court even questioned the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) for dropping the "murder" charge under section 302 of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) in its chargesheet, which only found the officials guilty of culpable homicide not amounting to murder under section 304(II) of the IPC.

The order passed by special judge Sanjay Jindal on Monday said it was clear that Gujjar was subjected to "extortion by the accused jail officials" and after he refused to pay more money, they "developed a grudge against him", following which he was brutally assaulted.

The accused include Ram Avtar Meena and Deepak Dabas, then assistant superintendents; Dinesh Chhikara, the head warden; and Harool Meena and Vinod Meena, the wardens. Following the incident, they were suspended for alleged misconduct by the then director general of prisons, Sandeep Goel.

"The deceased Ankit Gujjar

was beaten by the multiple accused persons with multiple weapons in the form of polycarbonate lathis by giving multiple blows," the court said.

The judge emphasised that there were reasons to believe that such lathis were carried by the accused for using criminal force on Gujjar and two other inmates. While there was nothing on record to suggest that such lathis were readily available at the spot and were used spontaneously, the court stated, "... the beatings were given on various parts on the body of the deceased including several vital parts as it is so clear from the details of injuries given in the postmortem report... it is also evident from the record that medical care was denied to the deceased after the incident".

The court also noted that the initial FIR lodged at the Hari Nagar police station was registered under IPC section 302 (murder), but the CBI's chargesheet was filed under IPC section 304 (culpable homicide not amounting to murder), among

other offences.

"There is no explanation in the chargesheet as to on what basis section 304 has been invoked, and section 302 has been dropped. Simply because the IO has not invoked section 302 IPC in the chargesheet, it cannot be said that the ingredients of the said offence cannot be considered by this court," the court said.

Observing that it was strange why CBI had not included the offence of extortion, the court went on to separately frame section 384 (extortion) of the IPC against Narendra.

On the intervening night of August 3 and 4, 2021, Gujjar, a gangster facing trial for multiple cases of murder and under the Gangster Act, was allegedly assaulted along with his two co-inmates, Gurpreet and Gurjeet. Gujjar succumbed to his injuries on August 4.

The court said that Narendra had allegedly demanded ₹2 lakh from Gujjar.

CBI claimed that Narendra and the other accused "denied proper medical treatment" to the victims and even "concealed information" regarding Gujjar's health from his family.

The Delhi High Court had on August 8, 2021, transferred the probe from Delhi Police to CBI after Gujjar's kin filed a writ petition demanding an impartial probe by an independent agency.

HC: FAILURE TO GET ASSESSEE'S INFO CAN'T BE GROUNDS TO CONTINUE LOC

NEW DELHI: The Delhi High Court has held that the failure of tax authorities to obtain information about an assessee's overseas assets cannot be a ground to continue a Look Out Circular (LOC) indefinitely, particularly when income tax proceedings have concluded, and no demand remains outstanding.

A bench of justices Dinesh Mehta and Vinod Kumar, in a judgment delivered on February 27, observed that the prolonged continuation of such an LOC would infringe an individual's fundamental rights.

The court rendered the decision while hearing a petition filed by two businessmen, Gaurav Dalmia and Mridu Hari Dalmia, who challenged the Income Tax (I-T) Department's decision to issue and continue a LOC against them without justification. They contended that a search was conducted at their residence and business premises in March 2021, following which an LOC was issued in April - May 2021 without any prior intimation.


"A search was conducted on 17.03.2021... the proceedings have been pending for about five years. If, for one reason or another, the respondents are not in a position to gather or elicit information from the foreign countries, the petitioners' rights cannot be kept suspended for an indefinite period," the court observed.

Seeing the city through the colours of Holi

Some of us see the world in rang. To understand how colour can turn the ordinary luminous, google the New York street-life photos clicked by the great Saul Leiter, where snow, shadows, umbrellas and anonymous citizens dissolve into impressionist poetry of colours. And today is Holi, when Delhi becomes colour. Let's invoke the festival by revisiting three places in the city defined by red, blue and green respectively.

Red: Walk along the long footpath on Netaji Subhash Marg that runs parallel to the red sandstone ramparts of the Red Fort. The path is separated from the fort walls by a green lawn, which remains out of limits. Anyways, to many Indians, especially those who live outside Delhi, the fort's strongest image is this grand sweep of red wall, made of the red sandstone that has been baked by centuries of sun and season. Every Independence Day, the Prime Minister stands on these red ramparts to address the nation. Indeed, to everyone who looks at the Red Fort from this footpath, the red edifice seems whole and impregnable, almost eternal in time. Step inside the red monument, and the illusion at once shatters. Much of the original palace complex was destroyed by the British after our

failed uprising in 1857. That said, as you walk, notice the narrow vertical slits in the red walls. Once, guards must have aimed their weapons through them. Today, the same slits release sudden flurries of grey pigeons, bunches of them spewing out of the red stones in swift, startling bursts.

Blue: In a city where a clear blue sky mostly exists like a rumour, it is dreamlike seeing Shivji Bhagwan gleaming in bright blue. Shiv Hanuman Mandir stands in Daryaganj's Pandit Rallaram Sharma Chowk. Atop the temple sits a blue-bodied Shiva, in yogic composure, gazing down at the restless world: honking traffic, bargaining shoppers, food vendors, rickshaw pullers, labourers. The temple has the Jaipur Namkeen Bhandar kachori-subzi stall attached to it like a limpet. Inside the sacred precincts, a peepal tree rises through an opening in the ceiling, its trunk piercing branching out above, leaning reverently over the blue deity.

Green: In Old Delhi's Meena Bazaar stands a tiny grave chamber, the resting place of Hazrat Hare Bhare Shah. Almost nothing is known about the Sufi mystic. But his shrine speaks silently in one single colour. This colour matches with the mystic's name: hare, or hara, which is green. So, inside the shrine, you'll see a green donation box, a green chaddar over the grave, green tiles decking up the grave chamber's walls, green lamps, and sometimes even visiting pilgrims happen to be in dresses that are coloured green.

SEVEN, INCLUDING 2 KIDS, INJURED IN CYLINDER BLAST IN SWAROOP NAGAR

NEW DELHI: Seven people, including two children, were injured in an LPG cylinder blast in an apartment in outer Delhi's Swaroop Nagar area on Tuesday, police said.

The blast led to a fire in the building housing the single-room apartment where five people, including a woman and two children, were staying.

"A police team reached the spot and found the third floor of the building engulfed in fire. The impact of the blast was such that debris fell on the second floor, injuring two women. The fire was doused, and the people in the room were rescued. All the injured were shifted to Burari Hospital," said DCP (outernorth) Hareshwar Swami.

All seven injured suffered minor injuries and are stable. A probe is underway to ascertain the cause of the cylinder blast, the DCP added.

42 candidates in Cong first list for Assam elections

GUWAHATI : The Congress on Tuesday released a list of 42 candidates for the upcoming assembly polls in Assam, becoming the first party in the state to announce contenders for the election. State Congress president and deputy leader of the party in Lok Sabha, Gaurav Gogoi, will be contesting the election from Jorhat, the parliamentary constituency he currently represents.

Assam is expected to go to polls in April for its 126-member assembly. The Congress, which is in talks with several Opposition parties to form an alliance against the ruling BJP-led government, has earlier said it plans to contest 100 seats.

Gogoi has been targeted by chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, who has alleged that the son of former chief minister Tarun Gogoi has links with the Pakistan establishment.

A special investigation team (SIT) report has also levelled similar allegations against Gogoi's British wife, Elizabeth, who was earlier posted in Pakistan and later in India as a representative of a climate action

group. Gogoi has admitted visiting Pakistan once in 2013, before he was first elected to the Lok Sabha in 2014, along with his wife who had official work there. He has, however, denied all allegations and rejected insinuations that he acted against national interest.

Other prominent candidates in the list include former state unit president Ripun Bora from Barchalla and Leader of Opposition Debabrata Saikia from Nazira, his family stronghold.

Among women candidates, sitting MLA Nandita Das has been fielded from the Hajo-Sualkuchi (SC) seat, while state women's wing president Mira Borthakur Goswami will contest from Dispur. At present, the ruling BJP's strength in the 126-member assembly is 64, while its allies AGP has nine MLAs, UPPL has seven and BPF has three members.

S-400 PURCHASE

aircraft did not take to the skies on May 10 when India blasted enemy airbases, air defence radars and command control systems. Early on the morning of May 10, 2025 an Indian BrahMos strike destroyed the Northern Command and Control network of Pakistan Air Force (PAF) at Chaklala Airbase in Rawalpindi. Pakistan sued for peace soon after.

The defence ministry is now waiting for the IAF and the Indian Army's proposal to buy 13 Russian Pantsir S-1 self-propelled missile systems, which counter medium-range surface-to-air missiles, short-range rockets, and kamikaze drones, the people cited above added. While 10 Pantsir systems will be purchased by the IAF to protect the 10 S-400 systems that Indian armed forces will ultimately have, three will be purchased by the army to tackle cruise missiles, attack helicopters, loitering ammunition, armed drones, rockets and short-range missiles on the borders.

Even though the modalities of S-400 acquisitions are to be negotiated, HT learns that all the five systems will be purchased outright, with maintenance, overhaul and repair given to Indian private sector players. Another route will be followed in the case of Pantsir — there will be an initial outright purchase under the fast-track route, but some systems will be made in India by private firms as the requirement is urgent. The Pantsir system is currently used by the UAE forces — and its effi-

cacy has been demonstrated in its ability to shoot Iranian kamikaze drones out of the sky.

India's size, the presence of adversaries on its western and northern borders, and its 11,000-km coastline, mean the country needs advanced air defence systems to not only counter enemy fighters and bombers way beyond visual range but also to neutralize ballistic missiles. The ongoing Iran-US war has highlighted the need for anti-ballistic missile systems globally due to proliferation of Chinese long-range missiles in the Indian sub-continent and West Asia. This apart, Turkey has been supplying low-cost kamikaze drones and loitering ammunition to Pakistan, Iran, Azerbaijan, Maldives and Bangladesh with the strategy of saturation bombing the enemy.

"Following an enemy attack, a projectile struck an Airbus aircraft... this plane is completely damaged," the agency said. "The shockwave (from the strike) caused damage to the airport terminal," it added, noting a second aircraft had also been hit.

The spiralling nature of the war raised questions about when and how it would end. Trump seemed to leave open the possibility for more extensive US military involvement, telling the New York Post on Monday that he was not ruling out the possibility of "boots on the ground".

The administration has given various objectives. While the initial US-Israeli strikes killed Iranian

Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei and Trump urged Iranians to overthrow their government, senior administration officials have since said regime change was not the goal.

Trump said Monday the military campaign's four objectives were to destroy Iran's missile capabilities, wipe out its navy, prevent it from obtaining a nuclear weapon and ensure that it cannot continue to support allied armed groups.

Trump said Tuesday that "someone from within" the Iranian regime might be the best choice to take power once the US-Israel campaign is finished.

Speaking from the Oval Office Tuesday, Trump said Reza Pahlavi, the exiled son of Iran's toppled Shah, is not someone that his administration has considered in depth to take over.

As far as possible leaders inside Iran, "the people we had in mind are dead," Trump said. "I guess the worst case would be to do this, and then somebody takes over who's as bad as the previous person, right? That could happen. We don't want that to happen."

Iran's leaders are scrambling to replace Khamenei, who ruled the country for 37 years. It is only the second time since the 1979 Islamic Revolution that a new supreme leader is being chosen. Potential candidates range from hardliners committed to confrontation with the West to reformists who seek diplomatic engagement.

The supreme leader has the final say on all major decisions, including war, peace and the country's disputed nuclear programme.

Across Iran's capital, aircraft were heard overhead and explosions rang out throughout the night into Tuesday.

The Israeli military said it conducted a wave of airstrikes on sites that produce and store ballistic missiles, in Tehran and Isfahan. Strikes caused two explosions at a broadcasting facility in Tehran, Iranian state TV said, adding that no one was injured.

The United Nations' nuclear watchdog said Iran's Natanz uranium enrichment site had sustained "some recent damage," though there was "no radiological consequence expected." The US hit Natanz during the 12-day war in June, when Israeli and American strikes greatly weakened Iran's nuclear programme.

Without offering evidence, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu claimed Iran was rebuilding "new sites, new places" underground for making atomic bombs. Iran has said it has not enriched uranium since June, though it has maintained its right to and says its nuclear programme is peaceful.

New rounds of US and Israeli airstrikes rattled Tehran and several other Iranian cities.

"Since midnight, my wife and I have been hearing the sound of explosions," said Ali Amoli, an engineer living in north Tehran. "Sometimes from the west side of the city and sometimes from other directions." Streets and gas stations appeared quieter than in recent days. Local media published images of a damaged commercial plane at Bushehr airport that broke apart following an airstrike on

Tuesday. A north Tehran resident who spoke on condition of anonymity for fear of retaliation described growing fears in the capital as it comes under heavy bombardment. The resident said most stores in the normally bustling area of Tajrish were closed and that ATMs were mostly "out of cash." Bakeries and supermarkets were open, though.

An attack from two drones on the US Embassy in Riyadh caused a "limited fire," according to Saudi Arabia's defence ministry, and the embassy urged Americans to avoid the compound. It followed an attack on the US Embassy in Kuwait. US Embassies in Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Lebanon said they were closed to the public.

The US State Department ordered the evacuation of non-emergency personnel and family in Kuwait, Bahrain, Iraq, Qatar, Jordan and the United Arab Emirates. In addition, the US has urged citizens to leave more than a dozen Middle Eastern countries, though with much of the airspace closed many remained stranded.

The State Department said Tuesday it is preparing military and charter flights for Americans who want to leave the Middle East. Several other countries arranged evacuation flights for their citizens.

The US-Israeli strikes have killed at least 787 people, according to the Iranian Red Crescent Society. The Iranian-supported militant group Hezbollah has also attacked Israel, whose retaliatory strikes killed 52 people in Lebanon.

The US military has confirmed six deaths of American service

members. In addition, three people were killed in the United Arab Emirates, and one each in Kuwait and Bahrain.

Iran has hit many countries deemed safe havens in the Mideast in retaliation for the US-Israeli strikes. Recent targets included two Amazon data centres in the United Arab Emirates and one in Bahrain. The centres in the UAE were hit, while a drone struck near the one in Bahrain, causing damage, the company said.

Iran has also struck energy facilities in Qatar and Saudi Arabia, and attacked several ships in the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow mouth of the Persian Gulf through which a fifth of all oil traded passes, sending global oil and natural gas prices soaring.

"The Strait of Hormuz is closed," declared Iranian Brig Gen Ebrahim Jabbari, an adviser to the paramilitary Revolutionary Guard, vowing that any ships that passed through it would be set on fire.

Oil and natural gas prices climbed, and stock prices fell sharply. The conflict has spread to Lebanon, where Hezbollah fired missiles at Israel on Monday, prompting Israel to retaliate.

On Tuesday, the Israeli military hit Beirut with more airstrikes and said it had moved additional troops into southern Lebanon and taken new positions on several strategic points close to the border.

The UN peacekeeping force in Lebanon later said its peacekeepers saw Israeli troops going into and then out of Lebanon. But Israel's army said its troops are still operating in Lebanon.

Belgium court weighs Choksi's extradition

NEW DELHI : A Belgian court on Tuesday heard the arguments for the extradition of Mehul Choksi, people familiar with the matter said, adding that evidence against the fugitive diamondaire was discussed by the Indian side and Choksi's defence team.

An officer said that the outcome of Tuesday's extradition hearing, which took place from 2 pm to 4 pm (Belgium time), "will be marked to the ministry of security and interior which will have the final say on whether to approve the court's decision and send Choksi back to India."

The interior ministry, this person said, may take at least a month to decide on the extradition. The decision of the court was not known till late evening as the legal team present in the court in Antwerp were yet to brief officials in Delhi.

"We are hoping for a positive decision as there was robust evidence against Choksi and all the courts in Belgium had earlier rejected all his appeals," said an officer who asked not to be named.

The legal team of Choksi has urged the Antwerp court to not extradite Choksi.

In December last year, Belgium's Supreme Court had

rejected Choksi's appeal against his arrest in Antwerp on New Delhi's request, and had ruled that his claims of being a subject of a political trial in India, or that he was abducted in 2021 in Antigua and Barbuda at the behest of India and runs risk of torture, are not "factual".

Choksi, 65, is held in a prison in Antwerp following his arrest on April 11 last year at India's request. Indian investigators have accused Choksi of six bank frauds, between 2018 and 2022, involving amounts totalling nearly ₹13,000 crore.

Choksi's extradition has been sought under Indian Penal Code (IPC) sections 120 B (criminal conspiracy), 201 (destruction of evidence), 409 (criminal breach of trust), 420 (cheating), 477A (falsification of accounts), and sections 7 and 13 (bribery) of the Prevention of Corruption Act; which are crimes in Belgium as well under the dual criminality clause of the extradition treaty.

India calls for restraint, flags safety of citizens

NEW DELHI: India emphasised the security of nearly 10 million Indians living in West Asia and the need to safeguard crucial trade and energy supply chains while calling for an early end to the Iran-US war on Tuesday, even as Prime Minister Narendra Modi discussed the ramifications of the widening conflict with the leaders of Kuwait, Oman and Qatar.

This was the second time that New Delhi called for de-escalation and restraint by all stakeholders in the region since Israel and the US launched military strikes on Iran on February 28, killing Iranian Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei and senior military leaders and triggering a wave of deadly retaliatory attacks against Israel and several other countries, including those hosting US military bases.

Oil prices have surged nearly 13%, hitting their highest level since January 2025, since Iranian forces effectively closed the Strait of Hormuz. Natural gas prices rose as QatarEnergy, one of the world's largest exporters, halted production following attacks on its facilities. These developments have increased concerns in India, the world's second largest purchaser of crude, with around 85% of its needs met through imports.

"In this background, India strongly reiterates its call for dialogue and diplomacy. We raise our voice clearly in favour of an early end to the conflict. Already, many lives have been regrettably lost and we express our grief in that regard," the external affairs ministry said in a detailed statement issued three days after its initial response. The ministry noted that nearly 10 million Indian citizens live and work in the Gulf region

and said: "Their safety and well-being is of utmost priority. We cannot be impervious to any development that negatively affects them." With India's trade and energy supply chains passing through the region, it warned that any "major disruption has serious consequences for the Indian economy".

As the conflict widened with further US and Israeli strikes on Iran and Iranian attacks on several West Asian countries, Modi spoke on phone with Oman's Sultan Haitham bin Tariq, Kuwait's Crown Prince Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah and Qatar's Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani as part of a continuing outreach to the leadership of the region.

During these conversations PM Modi reiterated India's message of dialogue and diplomacy and took up the well-being of Indians. He also denounced attacks on all three countries. Oman is home to more than 676,000 Indians, while Indians make up the largest expatriate communities in the two other countries — one million in Kuwait and 830,000 in Qatar. "We stand

firmly in solidarity with Qatar and strongly condemn any violation of its sovereignty and territorial integrity. We emphasised the urgent need to restore peace and stability in the region through dialogue and diplomacy," the PM said on social media after his phone call with Sheikh Tamim.

Modi conveyed similar messages to Kuwait's Sheikh Sabah and Oman's Sultan Haitham and said sustained diplomatic engagement is key to the "earliest restoration of regional peace". He also thanked all three leaders for their support for the Indian community at a challenging time.

External affairs minister S Jaishankar too spoke with foreign minister Constantinos Kombos of Cyprus, which currently holds the presidency of the Council of the European Union (EU), and EU foreign and security policy chief Kaja Kallas to discuss the conflict in Iran and the situation in West Asia.

Modi had earlier spoken to Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, Bahrain's King Hamad Bin Isa Al Khalifa, Jordan's King Abdullah II, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netan-

yahu and United Arab Emirates (UAE) President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed and expressed deep concern at the evolving situation. He also condemned attacks on these countries.

The ministry highlighted the prominent role played by Indian citizens in the global workforce, particularly at sea, while voicing concern over attacks on merchant shipping.

"Already, some Indian nationals have lost their lives or are missing as a result of such attacks in the last few days," it said. At least three Indian seafarers were killed in Iranian strikes on two merchant vessels in waters off Oman since the weekend, and about 20 more Indians were injured in strikes across West Asia. Indians account for roughly 12% of the global seafaring workforce, with more than 320,000 active sailors, and attacks on merchant vessels during recent regional conflicts have frequently resulted in Indian casualties.

The Indian side said the conflict had not only intensified but spread to other nations in recent days, and "destruction and deaths have mounted", while normal life and economic activities came to a halt. "As a proximate neighbour with critical stakes in the security and stability of the region, these developments evoke great anxiety," the statement said, adding that the situation had deteriorated significantly and continuously in the holy month of Ramzan.

Like the statement issued on February 28, the one on Tuesday was silent on the killing of Iran's Supreme Leader or civilian casualties caused by the strikes on Iran. As the US and Israel continued their strikes, Iranian state-run media outlets reported that the death toll had risen to 787.

CBSE DEFERS CLASS 10, 12 BOARD EXAMS IN WEST ASIAN COUNTRIES

NEW DELHI: The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) on Tuesday further postponed class 10 and 12 board examinations scheduled for Thursday and Friday in several West Asian countries following the US-Israel joint strikes on Iran and the latter's retaliatory strikes on neighbouring Gulf states.

Extending its earlier decision of postponing the examinations amid the "current situation" in West Asia, the board in a fresh circular on Tuesday informed principals of over 150 CBSE-affiliated schools in Bahrain, Iran, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) that after a "critical review" of the situation in parts of the region, it has decided to postpone examinations scheduled for both class 10 and 12.

"The new dates shall be announced later," the circular said. "All students are advised to stay in touch with their schools for updates and follow official announcements carefully."

This comes two days after CBSE had postponed the March 2 examinations in the same West Asian countries, saying it would review the situation before taking a call on examinations of subsequent papers.

The ongoing war in West Asia has affected thousands of Indian students studying in CBSE-affiliated schools in the region, particularly in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Saudi Arabia.

"We are yet to estimate the number of affected students. Our current focus is on reviewing the situation in affected countries and issuing timely updates and circulars containing all the relevant information," a CBSE official said, declining to be named.

'No shortage of energy, have sufficient reserves'

NEW DELHI: The West Asia conflict does not pose any immediate threat to India's energy security, according to people aware of the matter who cited what they said were crude oil and fuel stocks of 25 days each, as the government sought to allay concerns from observers following repeated escalation in hostilities in the Gulf — a region from where close to half of India's crude oil imports come.

Petroleum minister Hardeep Singh Puri said India has sufficient energy reserves to deal with the ongoing situation and that consumers of petrol, diesel and cooking gas will not immediately face any shortage.

India imports just over five million barrels of crude per day, of which roughly 2.5 million bpd transit the Strait of Hormuz, the 33-kilometre passage between Iran and Oman through which shipping has ground to a near-halt after Iranian retaliatory strikes on the Gulf. Qatar, which is one of the main suppliers of LNG, paused production on Monday.

The ministry said it has established a 24x7 control room to monitor supply and stock positions across the country. "At present, the government is reasonably comfortable in terms of stocks," it said in a statement, adding it was "cautiously optimistic that phased measures can be taken, if required, to further mitigate the situation."

People with direct knowledge of the matter said India has crude oil stocks for 25 days and fuel stocks

for 25 days, over and above the stockpile in strategic petroleum reserves — and has diversified its energy sourcing from over 40 countries, reducing dependence on Hormuz supplies to 40%.

Over 60% of India's energy needs are now met from producers in North America, Latin America, West Africa and the Asian part of Russia, they said, requesting anonymity, adding that cargoes not routed through the Strait would remain available to mitigate any temporary disruption.

On natural gas, India also holds cooking gas stocks sufficient to last over three weeks. New Delhi is in touch with producers including Canada and Norway for additional LNG supplies, as Iran's attack has disrupted the production capacity of Qatar, one of India's major suppliers. "Besides Qatar, India is having long-term, large supply contracts for LNG from the US, Australia and Russia," one of the people said. The government noted that only 50% of India's natural gas requirements are met through imports, and that domestic gas output is sufficient to meet cooking gas requirements in an emergency.

The person cited above said the

conflict is not being seen as one that will stretch on. "The war is unlikely to continue for long and we do not foresee any threat to country's energy security immediately," he said. People estimated that situation may ease in the next couple of weeks.

The conflict's impact on supply is no longer merely logistical after developments this week. Iraq has cut output at the giant Rumaila oil field, as storage tightens due to export disruptions at Hormuz, Bloomberg reported. Saudi Aramco halted operations at its Ras Tanura refinery after a drone strike on Monday, while debris from an intercepted drone caused a major fire at the UAE oil-trading hub of Fujairah, Bloomberg reported. This facility is unique since it opens into the Gulf of Oman, accessible to vessels from the Indian Ocean without having to navigate the Strait of Hormuz.

Kpler, which tracks global energy flows, puts India's combined commercial stocks — including strategic reserves and floating cargo already at sea — at around 100 million barrels, or 40-45 days of import cover.

Besides inventories of crude oil and products held with refiners, pipelines and depots, the state-run Indian Strategic Petroleum Reserves Ltd operates three underground storage facilities with a combined capacity of 5.33 million tonnes. Two planned expansions — at Chandikhol in Odisha (4 million tonnes) and an additional facility at Padur in Karnataka (2.5 million tonnes), announced in 2021 — remain incomplete.

Conflict jolts India's fertiliser supply, shipping cost doubles

NEW DELHI: The war in West Asia is roiling the fertiliser business in India, with imports being hit by an increase in shipping costs and the closure of a key route, and domestic manufacturing being crimped by shortage of gas, analysts and fertiliser industry executives said.

Deals for fertiliser imports are typically finalised during December-February for the summer season, but with shipping costs doubling and no vessel being able to clear the Strait of Hormuz, a globally critical chokepoint for most shipments, the situation is dire, analysts said. The domestic crop-nutrient industry is staring at another key risk — a shortage of imported gas supplies, which fire fertiliser plants. Qatar on Monday paused production of liquefied natural gas, as Iran continued to retaliate against Gulf countries following Israeli and US strikes against it. India imports around 50-60% of its natural gas.

In 2024, the domestic fertiliser industry accounted for about 30.6% of India's total natural gas consumption, making it the single largest user. India is the top importer of UAE's LNG and the second-largest buyer of Qatari gas, according to commerce ministry data. "State-run gas companies have already started to ration gas supplies to industrial buyers from Tuesday," a fertiliser industry executive said, requesting ano-

nymity. The benchmark freight rate for large crude tankers on Monday rose to an all-time high of \$423,736 per day, according to the London Stock Exchange Group.

This has had a ripple effect on all containerised cargo. "The increases, including for shipping and insurance, has raised fertilisers import costs by nearly 25-30%," said Supal Sharma, a director at fertiliser trading firm Epic Abundance Ltd.

Shipping through the strait, wedged between Iran and Oman, has ground to a halt. As well as for global trade, the waterway is a vital passage for Indian shipments, carrying half of India's crude oil and gas, nearly 60% of fertilisers and most other commodities.

"Indian importers last month concluded imports of 1.3 million tonnes of urea for the summer season. The focus now is on how to get existing contracts delivered safely, instead of focussed on forward deliveries, for which a wait-and-watch stance is being adopted," said Anand Tewotia, an

agent of Sai Fertilisers Ltd. India is a net importer of fertilisers, buying 20-21 million tonnes annually. Imports of finished products and raw materials are sourced almost entirely from West Asian and Gulf countries as well as north African producers, such as Egypt and Morocco.

India had a sufficient buffer stock of fertilisers for the winter season, finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman told Parliament on October 15. Urea stocks on October 31 were 6.8 million tonnes, higher than the winter demand of 5 million tonnes. Qatar, the UAE and Oman together supply nearly 76% of India's sulphur imports, while Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Iran are the three top exporters of urea, the most used crop nutrient in India. All of them ship through the Strait of Hormuz.

Morocco, which supplies India with phosphates, typically uses the Seuz-Red Sea conduit, where vessel movement has become difficult due to potential attacks from Yemeni Houthis, an Iranian ally. Nearly 40% of supplies used the Suez waterway.

Global container shipping lines, such as Hapag-Lloyd, CMA CGM and MSC, have reversed decisions to return to the Seuz Canal-Red Sea route due to escalating risks.

The Red Sea risks imperil imports from Russia, another big supplier of phosphate-based nutrients to India.

'Most Indian students moved to safer locations'

NEW DELHI: Hundreds of Indian students have been moved from the Iranian capital of Tehran to safer locations, including the city of Qom, people familiar with the matter said on Tuesday amid the widening of the Iran-US conflict and continuing American and Israeli bombardment of the country.

The Indian embassy in Tehran said in a statement that "most Indian students" in Tehran had been relocated to safer places outside the city because of the "heightened risk perception" in the Iranian capital. The embassy made arrangements for their transportation, food and accommodation.

The people cited above said there were some 300 Indian students in Tehran, mostly from Jammu & Kashmir, and most of them had been shifted to Qom and other cities. There are some 3,000 Indian students in Iran, including about 2,000 from J&K. About 1,000 Indian students had left Iran when widespread protests against the government erupted last December, they said.

The Indian embassy said "only a small number" of Indian students, who declined the mission's offer to be relocated, remained in Tehran.

The embassy reiterated its earlier advisory urging Indians in Iran to stay where they are, remain indoors, avoid unnecessary movements, exercise due caution, and avoid all areas witnessing protests or demonstrations.

The embassy also called on Indian nationals to remain in regular contact with the mission.

There have been no reports so far of Indian casualties in the Israeli and US attacks on Iran,

which have killed more than 780 people since the weekend.

There are some 9,000 Indians in Tehran, including small traders, theological students and a small number of professionals. The number has declined in recent years because of regional tensions and the downturn in trade relations. Shia pilgrims from India also travel to Iran every year, but their numbers too have fallen in recent years.

The Iran-US conflict has widened with Tehran launching attacks against several West Asian countries, including those housing American military bases, after Iranian Supreme

Leader Ali Khamenei was killed in a strike on his office compound in the capital on Saturday.

Many students still stranded in parts of Iran

Meanwhile, several Indian students particularly staying in places like Urmia and Khuzestan Province feel stranded amid constantly deteriorating security situation with no option to return, and limited communication from family and friends.

For 23-year-old Labeeb Qadri, a native of Srinagar currently pursuing an MBBS at Urmia University, every minute is fraught with fear as missiles are being launched. "The situation has not been good at all for the last few days. Here in Urmia, attacks are taking place repeatedly. About one hour ago, an attack happened just 300 metres from my dormitory," said Qadri.

Another student said poor internet connectivity as stranded them digitally as well from family and friends. "We don't have proper internet access, only view have access to Virtual Private Network (VPN) and that too works quite slowly and it takes so long time to deliver just one

message," said Asif Gulzar, who belongs to Jammu and Kashmir's Pattan Baramulla and is a third-year MBBS student in Ahvaz, Jundishapur University of Medical Science.

Other students told HT that the Indian Embassy has advised them to stay indoors since evacuation is currently impossible, and they are managing amid the uncertainty with support from locals and the university.

"The Indian Embassy has told us to stay indoors, as the borders and airspace are closed. We cannot evacuate through other countries right now," Qadri said.

While they navigate the situation in war-hit Iran, their families in India are struggling with helplessness over the entire situation. "My daughter was here in Kashmir and returned just 15 days ago when the situation seemed to have stabilised, but now our communication is limited to a few text messages." "She tries to sound calm, yet we all know how terrible things really are," said the father of a third-year medical student in Iran, adding that over the past four days he has regretted every minute that he allowed her to go back.

37 Indian ships stuck in Persian Gulf, Oman

NEW DELHI: As many as 37 Indian-flagged ships with over 1,000 seafarers are stuck in the Persian Gulf, the Gulf of Oman and the adjoining sea areas as the key shipping route through the Strait of Hormuz is closed due to the ongoing military actions involving the United States, Israel and Iran.

While some ships are carrying crude oil and LNG to Indian ports, others are on the way to bring petroleum products from the Gulf nations.

A total of 37 Indian-flagged ships with 1,109 sailors are stuck in the Persian Gulf, the Gulf of Oman and the adjoining sea areas due to the closure of the key shipping route through the Strait of Hormuz, an official privy to the development told PTI.

The Directorate General of Shipping is in regular touch with the shipping companies and is closely monitoring the situation.

At least three Indian seafarers on board foreign-flagged vessels were killed, and one was injured

in West Asia due to the current conflict. A dedicated quick response team has been set up by the shipping ministry to enable timely coordination among authorities, and ensure immediate response to emerging situations and facilitate prompt assistance to Indian seafarers and their families.

Shipping companies and Recruitment and Placement Service Licensees (RPSLs) have been advised to exercise caution in crew deployment and maintain regular communication with seafarers and their families. Helpline numbers have also been activated and shared with the families of the seafarers through RPSLs.

The directorate general of shipping also issued an advisory for maritime operators to assess voyage-specific risks following the disruptions of the shipping route and closure of the Strait of Hormuz by Iran.

It is closely monitoring the evolving maritime security situation in the Persian Gulf, the Strait of Hormuz, the Gulf of Oman and the adjoining sea areas.

India to operate 58 flights to Middle East

NEW DELHI: The Indian government announced Tuesday that airlines will operate 58 flights to the Middle East on March 4 and are deploying additional capacity to evacuate tens of thousands of passengers stranded by widespread regional conflict.

"Special arrangements are being made to facilitate the movement of stranded passengers, with airlines deploying additional capacity where required and coordinating closely with foreign aviation authorities and Indian missions abroad to ensure safe and orderly passenger movement," the civil aviation ministry stated.

The government's intervention comes as the scope of the war expands during its fourth day, triggering massive global and domestic aviation disruptions. More than 12,300 flights have been cancelled worldwide since Iran's first retaliatory strike, paralysing major transit hubs such as Dubai and Doha, according to aviation tracker FlightRadar24.

In India, the escalating crisis

involving the United States, Israel and Iran has resulted in 1,221 cancellations by Indian carriers and 388 by foreign carriers to date. The civil aviation ministry figures, tracking disruptions since February 28, show Indian carriers cancelled 104 international flights on Tuesday alone. Over the past three days, 1,117 international flights were grounded. Globally, the cancellations continue to reverberate as out-of-position aircraft and crew members force carriers to run special evacuation flights.

Domestically, Indian carriers

operated 24 flights on Tuesday. The scheduled 58 flights for March 4 include 30 by IndiGo and 23 by Air India and Air India Express. Additionally, Emirates and Etihad operated nine flights from the Gulf region in the preceding 24 hours.

Notwithstanding the planned operations, Air India stated on the social media platform X: "In view of the continuing situation in the Middle East, Air India has extended the suspension of most flights to and from the UAE, Saudi Arabia, Israel and Qatar until 23:59 hrs IST on 4 March

2026."

The ministry noted that Indian carriers have undertaken calibrated schedule adjustments, progressively resuming long-haul operations through alternative routings to avoid restricted airspace. The government is continuously monitoring airfares to prevent undue price surges. "All airlines have been advised to maintain transparent communication with passengers and ensure adherence to regulatory requirements concerning refunds, rescheduling and passenger assistance," the ministry stated. Indicating a slight improvement in the region, the UAE economy ministry said the country is establishing safe air corridors allowing up to 48 flights an hour.

More than 80 additional flights are scheduled, providing a capacity exceeding 27,000 passengers, the ministry stated.

There are close to 9 million Indians in the Gulf countries, and another 10,000 in Iran apart from hundreds, and potentially thousands, of Indian citizens caught at West Asia airports that function as crucial stopovers for longhaul flights.

LEFT PARTIES ACCUSE GOVT OF STAYING SILENT

NEW DELHI: Left parties on Tuesday held a protest at Delhi's Jantar Mantar against the US-Israel attack on Iran and the killing of Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, the supreme leader of the Islamic Republic, accusing the Centre of maintaining silence on the issue.

Scores of protesters gathered here, holding placards and raising slogans against the attack. They urged people to "stand against the attack" and express solidarity with the Iranian people.

"The silence of the government of India over (US President Donald) Trump's imperialist hooliganism, the attack on Iran... Why is Narendra Modi quiet?" CPI(M) leader Brinda Karat said. "He held Netanyahu's bloodied hands and said it is the voice of the people of India... How is this the voice of the people? You went to Israel to help a genocide," she said. "Did you go there to give a stamp of approval?" she asked, further questioning if the Israeli prime minister wants to "completely decimate Gaza".

INDIA INCLINED TO BUY MORE RUSSIAN CRUDE: DEPUTY PM

MOSCOW: Russia on Tuesday claimed that India has signalled "renewed interest" in importing larger volumes of Russian crude oil amid disruptions in energy supplies following the closure of the Strait of Hormuz after US and Israeli strikes on Iran.

The Strait of Hormuz is the world's most critical oil shipping chokepoint. It is facing disruptions after Iranian actions in response to US and Israeli strikes.

"Yes, we are getting signals of renewed interest from India," Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak told the state-run TV Rossiya 1 on the sidelines of an event in Moscow.

Nearly a fifth of the world's oil supply and a significant share of liquefied natural gas exports pass through the narrow waterway linking the Persian Gulf with global markets. Novak did not rule out the possibility that the European Union could also ease its decision to curtail imports of Russian hydrocarbons in view of the unfolding energy crisis.

Def ministry signs ₹5,083-cr pacts for ALH, Shtil missiles

NEW DELHI: The defence ministry on Tuesday signed two contracts worth ₹5,083 crore for six advanced light helicopters (ALH) for the coast guard, and Shtil surface-to-air vertical launch missiles for the navy to boost their operational readiness.

The ALH contract with Hindustan Aeronautics Limited is worth ₹2,901 crore and covers operational equipment, an engineering support package, and performance-based logistics support, while the one for missiles was signed with Russia's Rosobronexport and is valued at ₹2,182 crore, the defence ministry said in a statement.

The induction of the new ALHs will significantly enhance the coast guard's capability to carry out duties, including the protection of artificial islands, offshore installations, fishermen, and the marine environment, it added.

"These twin-engine helicopters incorporate state-of-the-art features superior to the currently operated airborne platforms and are capable of undertaking a wide spectrum of maritime security missions from shore-based airfields as well as from ships at sea." The project will involve the supply of equipment from more than

200 MSMEs and is expected to generate approximately 6.5 million man-hours of employment. HAL recently fixed a nagging flaw afflicting a key component of the transmission system of the navy and coast guard's ALHs and they are likely to be cleared to fly again in April, ending the longest grounding of an aircraft in the Indian military.

The workhorse fleet was grounded in January 2025 following a fatal coast guard crash.

NEW DELHI: The Indian Navy will commission its latest indigenous stealth frigate, Taragiri, on March 14, with the induction further strengthening the navy's ability to secure the country's maritime interests in the vast Indian Ocean region where China is seeking to expand its footprint, officials aware of the matter said on Tuesday.

The commissioning ceremony will take place in Visakhapatnam, they added. The navy took delivery of Taragiri, the fourth Nilgiri-class stealth frigate under Project 17A, from Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Ltd (MDL) last November. The seven-ship P-17A is worth around ₹45,000 crore.

The remaining three frigates are expected to be inducted into the navy by year-end. Nilgiri, Udaygiri and Himgiri were commissioned into service last year, and Mahendragiri, Dunagiri and Vindhayagiri will follow Taragiri into the navy this year.

The navy is working towards becoming fully self-reliant by 2047

when India celebrates 100 years of independence. Around 60 warships are under construction at various Indian yards.

The P-17A platforms showcase the country's warship building prowess, have an indigenous content of 75% and come with modern weapons, sensors and systems to dominate the sea battlespace. P-17A is a follow-on of the Shivalik-class (P-17) stealth frigates and represents a significant upgrade over the previous warships.

Nilgiri and Udaygiri were built at MDL, which has also constructed Taragiri. Mahendragiri is being constructed at MDL too. Himgiri was built at Kolkata-based Garden Reach Shipbuilders and Engineers (GRSE) Limited, where Dunagiri and Vindhayagiri are in different stages of construction.

The frigates are/will be equipped with modern weapons, sensors, and electronic warfare suites, including the BrahMos supersonic cruise missile, MF-STAR surveillance radar, the Barak-8 surface-to-air missile system and anti-submarine warfare capabilities.

INFANT DIED AFTER BRICK KILN OWNER BARRED HOSPITAL VISIT, SAYS FATHER

JAIPUR: A two-month-old infant of two Uttar Pradesh-based labourers died at a brick kiln in Rajasthan's Udaipur district after the owner allegedly forbade them from taking the child to any hospital for treatment, alleged the victim's father.

Inspector of Ghata police station, Surendra Singh, said, "No case has yet been lodged in this matter. We are carrying out an investigation. Necessary action will be taken accordingly."

The father of the deceased, Raj Jatav (27), said, "A few days after reaching the kiln in Ghata, my daughter fell sick. I repeatedly requested permission to take her to a hospital, but the owners and other managing staff refused every time," he said.

The kiln authority allowed Raj to take her to a local PHC only on February 25 when Anaya's condition seriously deteriorated, he said. "However, the PHC's doctor diagnosed that Anaya was suffering from pneumonia and asked us to immediately shift her to a better hospital. We asked the management for money to get her admitted to a private hospital in the city, but they refused again, forcing us to return to the kiln and resume work. Meanwhile, Anaya passed away on Saturday," said Raj.

Girl dies by suicide at Manipur relief camp

IMPHAL: A 17-year-old girl allegedly died by suicide at a relief camp in Manipur's Bishnupur district on Tuesday, police said, adding that an unnatural death case has been registered.

Due to the ongoing tensions in the ethnic strife-torn state, the girl and her family were displaced from Leimaram Waroiching, Bishnupur, and had been taking shelter at the Leimaram High School relief camp since March 3, 2023, police said.

In December last year, the Manipur administration had resettled 257 displaced people from 64 households in a relief camp in Bishnupur.

"A few days back, the girl had asked her family to return to their home as she didn't want to stay at the relief camp. On Tuesday, she was found dead at the northern side of the camp's veranda," a police officer said.

Police registered a case under

Section 194 (unnatural death) of BNSS and the body was sent to the Regional Institute of Medical Science (RIMS) Hospital, Imphal, for post-mortem examination, the officer added.

"The girl was studying in Class 12 and was appearing for the ongoing higher secondary examination conducted by the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Manipur (CoSHEM). The examination began on February 17 and will end on March 20," the officer said.

Of the 31,530 students appearing for the exam, 412 are internally displaced students from both hills and valley.

The state government had implemented a phased rehabilitation programme and was targeting to resettle 40,000 displaced people by March 31.

UP: Rape accused guns down 17-year-old victim

LUCKNOW: A 22-year-old man, wanted by the police for raping a 17-year-old, shot dead the victim early on Tuesday in Uttar Pradesh's Basti district, officers said, adding they are now on the lookout for the absconding accused.

According to the police, around 1 am on Tuesday, the accused entered the victim's house through its back door and fired two shots at the girl — one in the head and another in the neck — while she was sleeping next to her brother. The accused also assaulted and threatened the brother. When the girl's mother, who was sleeping outside, confronted the attacker, he also fired at her but missed.

Basti additional superintendent of police (ASP) Shyamakant said the family identified the accused, and teams have been formed to apprehend him.

"The man, a resident of the same village as the victim, had

drugged and raped the girl in December last year and took photos and made videos of the act, which he threatened to make public. He had even posted some of them on social media on December 16. The family then lodged a complaint, and the police registered an FIR on December 17 against the accused at Kalwari police station under POCSSO Act and IT Act. The accused had been on the run since then," said Shyamakant.

The girl's father works in Punjab while she lived with her mother and brother, and was preparing for the UP Board exams, police added.

BJP announces 9 names for RS polls; Nabin from Bihar

NEW DELHI: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Tuesday announced nine candidates for the 2026 biennial elections to the Rajya Sabha across six states, setting the stage for the high-stakes polls later this month.

At least three states — Maharashtra, Bihar and Odisha — are likely to see a contest. From Bihar, where five seats are falling vacant, the BJP nominated party chief Nitin Nabin and state leader Shivesh Kumar. Separately, a Janata Dal (United) minister said that chief minister Nitish Kumar's son, Nishant Kumar, was set to enter politics.

"He will be given a bigger responsibility in the party. What responsibility he is going to get will be decided in a day or two," said minister Sharwan Kumar. Asked if Nishant can be sent to the Rajya Sabha, Kumar said, "Anything can happen."

Thursday is the last date of filing nominations for the March 16 elections.

In the state where 41 first-preference votes are required to win a seat, the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) has the numbers to win four seats outright. It requires three opposition votes to win the fifth seat, likely to go to former minister Upendra Kushwaha.

In Assam, where three seats go to the polls, the BJP fielded sitting MLA Terash Gowalla and cabinet minister Jogen Mohan.

Chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma stated on Tuesday that BJP won't be fielding any candidate for the third seat as the party has no chance of winning.

In Assam, which has 126 MLAs in its assembly, at least 32

first preference votes are needed to win when the contest for three seats. The BJP has 67 members in the assembly, while the Congress has 22.

In Chhattisgarh, where two seats are falling vacant, member of the party's Chhattisgarh State Women Commission, Laxmi Verma, was named as the candidate.

As 31 first-preference votes are required to secure a victory, the BJP (54 seats) and the Congress (35 seats) can win one Rajya Sabha seat each.

In Haryana, where two seats go to the polls, former MP Sanjay Bhatia was named as the candidate. As 31 votes each are required for the two candidates to make it to the Rajya Sabha, the other seat will go to the Congress.

In the 90-member Haryana Assembly, the ruling BJP has 48

MLAs, Congress 37, the INLD has two, while three Independents support the ruling party.

In Odisha, where four seats go to the polls, the party nominated party's Odisha unit president Manmohan Samal and outgoing Rajya Sabha MP Sujeeet Kumar. Dilip Ray is also filing nomination saying he has BJP support and he's likely to square off for the fourth seat against joint CONG-BJD candidate Datteswar Hota.

With 79 MLAs of its own and the support of three Independents, the BJP commands 82 votes in the 147-member assembly. As 30 first-preference votes are required per candidate to secure victory, the party can comfortably elect both its nominees and still have 22 surplus votes in hand.

In West Bengal, where five seats go to the polls, former

West Bengal unit president Rahul Sinha was named as the candidate. With an absolute majority in the Assembly, the TMC held the four other seats and will win them again.

With 75 legislators in the 294-member Assembly against the Trinamool Congress's 215, the BJP has the numbers to ensure Sinha's victory.

In Bihar, Nabin's candidature assumed significance as he recently took over as the BJP's national president, marking a generational shift in the party's top leadership.

A prominent face from Bihar, Nabin held key organisational and ministerial responsibilities in the state and is considered close to the party's central leadership.

Party leaders indicated that sending Nabin to the Rajya Sabha would provide him a parliamentary platform commensurate with his organisational responsibilities. As national president, he is expected to steer the party through a series of crucial assembly elections and prepare the ground for the next general election cycle.

The second nominee from Bihar, Kumar, is regarded as an organisational hand with experience in state-level party affairs.

In Maharashtra, where seven seats are falling vacant, the ruling Mahayuti can win six and there might be a contest for the seventh seat, which the opposition Maha Vikas Aghadi is hoping to win.

NCP (SP) has said party chief Sharad Pawar should be the opposition nominee but the Congress and the Shiv Sena (UBT) have expressed reservations.

DMDK general secretary Premalatha Vijayakanth will announce the candidate for the RS polls. DMDK leader LK Sudhish told reporters after signing the electoral pact with the DMK.

A party release from the DMK said one RS seat was allotted to DMDK following talks between DMK President MK Stalin and DMDK treasurer LK Sudhish.

It was also decided that the number of Assembly seats to be earmarked for DMDK will be decided following talks between the two parties, it added.

Leaders of both the DMK and DMDK were present when the electoral pact was signed by Stalin and Sudhish.

Of the six RS vacancies from Tamil Nadu, DMK could elect 4 and the main opposition AIADMK 2.

In the 2020 elections, the DMK-led alliance won four of the six Rajya Sabha berths in Tamil Nadu. In the 234-member assembly, the DMK holds a majority with 133 seats.

The Desiya Murpokku Dravida Kazhagam (DMDK)—the party of the late actor and former opposition leader Vijayakanth—joined the ruling DMK-led Secular Progressive Alliance (SPA) on February 19.

LS privileges panel formed; Prasad to head

NEW DELHI: Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla on Tuesday constituted the House's Privileges Committee for the 18th Lok Sabha, appointing BJP leader and former Union law minister Ravi Shankar Prasad as its chairman.

This is the first time members have been appointed to the panel in the 18th Lok Sabha.

The 15-member committee has eight MPs from the ruling National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and seven from the Opposition. The panel deals with complaints of breach of privilege by lawmakers against officials as well as against fellow MPs. The committee comes into effect from Tuesday.

Apart from Prasad, the BJP members on the panel are Brijmohan Agrawal, Jagadish Shettar, Ramvir Singh Bidhuri, Sangeeta Kumari Singh Deo, Jagdambika Pal and Trivendra Singh Rawat.

The Opposition members include Congress leaders Tariq Anwar, Manickam Tagore and Manish Tewari, DMK's T.R. Baalu, Kalyan Banerjee of the Trinamool Congress, Shiv Sena MP Shirringappa Chandu Barne, Shiv Sena (UBT) MP Arvind Ganpat Sawant and Samajwadi Party MP Dharmendra Yadav.

However, Congress MP Manickam Tagore, named as a commit-

tee member, said he could not attend the meeting as he was suspended. "I am suspended. I can't attend the Committee meeting," Tagore posted on X.

Tagore is among eight Opposition MPs who were suspended for the remainder of the Budget session. The second phase of the session will begin on March 9 and conclude on April 2.

The committee has been formed amid frequent threats of breach of privilege notices exchanged between treasury and Opposition benches in recent sessions. During the recent Budget session, the BJP had initially planned to move a breach of privilege notice against Leader of the Opposition Rahul Gandhi over alleged misleading remarks against PM Narendra Modi. However, the plan was dropped at the time as the privileges committee had not yet been constituted.

BJP MP Nishikant Dubey later moved a substantive motion against Gandhi.

EX-UNION MIN UNNIKRISHNAN DIES IN KERALA

KOZHIKODE: Former Union minister K P Unnikrishnan, who was regarded as one of the prominent figures in Indian politics during the 1980s and 1990s, died in the early hours of Tuesday, his family said.

He was 89. He died while undergoing treatment for age-related ailments at a private hospital in Kozhikode, they said, adding His cremation will be held at Manari crematorium on Wednesday.

Having been elected to the Lok Sabha six consecutive times from Vadakara, he served as a Union minister in the VP Singh Cabinet, holding the portfolios of Surface Transport and Communications during 1989-90.

During his tenure as Minister, he oversaw the evacuation of Indians during the Gulf War.

Condoling the demise of Unnikrishnan, Kerala chief minister Pinarayi Vijayan said he had attempted to preserve Nehruvian values within the Congress.

Unnikrishnan was a Keralite who stood tall in national politics, he said. "At crucial moments, the nation listened to his positions," Vijayan said, paying tribute to "the strong national advocate of democratic secular politics".

Born on September 20, 1936, he was educated at Madras Christian College in Chennai, PTI

Chinese GoPro camera used in Pahalgam attack: NIA probe

NEW DELHI: A GoPro Hero 12 camera suspected to have been used in the April 22, 2025 terror attack at Baisaran Meadow in Pahalgam, Kashmir has been traced to a distributor in China, according to an investigation by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) which is approaching the Chinese government seeking information on the device.

According to an application filed by the federal anti-terror probe agency before a Jammu court, a letter rogatory or LR (a judicial request seeking information from a foreign country) is being issued seeking assistance regarding the camera.

"...during the course of investigation of aforesaid case, various material objects and electronic devices connected with conspiracy and execution of said terrorist attack have been examined. One such crucial electronic device is a GoPro Hero 12 Black Camera, bearing serial No.C3501325471706 which is relevant for establishing pre-attack reconnaissance, move-

ment and operational preparation of terrorist module involved in Pahalgam attack," said a Jammu court order on Monday permitting NIA to issue LR to China.

NIA originally approached the manufacturer of GoPro in Netherlands seeking details on the supply chain and the activation of the device.

The manufacturer, GoPro B.V. informed the agency that the camera "was supplied to AE Group International Limited, a distributor based in the People's Republic of China; and was activated on January 30, 2024 at Dongguan, People's Republic of China."

"The manufacturer has further stated that it does not possess downstream transaction details or end-user records of the said

device. The activation, initial use and commercial trail of the said device lie within the territorial jurisdiction of the People's Republic of China, and the information necessary to trace the purchaser, end-user and associated technical records can only be obtained through judicial assistance of the Chinese authorities, hence the application," said the court order issued on Monday.

The court allowed NIA to issue the LR to China.

The April 22 terror attack at the picturesque Baisaran meadow brought India and Pakistan at the brink of a full-scale war. India launched Operation Sindoor in the early hours of May 7 and struck terror and military installations in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) before the May 10 ceasefire.

Three terrorists -- Suleiman Shah, Hamza Afghani alias Afghan and Jibril -- who shot dead 25 tourists and a pony operator on April 22 at Baisaran meadow in Pahalgam were killed by security forces during an encounter on July 28 in Dachigam forest area.

CHIDAMBARAM MEETS STALIN AMID IMPASSE ON SEAT SHARING

CHENNAI: Senior Congress leader P Chidambaram, accompanied by TNCC chief K Selva-perunthagai, called on Chief Minister M K Stalin at his camp office here on Tuesday amidst an impasse between the two parties over the seat-sharing talks.

During the hour-long meeting with Stalin, Congress leaders discussed various issues affecting both the parties and a final decision would be taken soon, a source in the Congress said.

The source said both the parties wanted the alliance to continue but there had been some disagreement over the number of seats that would be allotted to the Congress. Initially, the DMK had offered one Rajya Sabha seat to the Congress and the talks hinged on the number of seats to be allocated to the party, which had demanded 39 seats.

It is likely to settle for 28 seats and two Rajya Sabha seats, the source added.

"DMK wants the alliance to continue. Talks are continuing and our leader will arrive at a good decision. Our leader wants to amicably resolve the issue," DMK spokesperson TKS Elangovan told reporters in Vellore in the state.

Earlier, Selva-perunthagai called on Chidambaram and following a discussion, both went to the CM's residence. The Congress high command had asked Chidambaram to resume the talks directly with the DMK leadership and bring about an amicable solution following a dead lock during the meetings between the Congress seat-sharing committee led by Tamil Nadu in-charge Girish Chodankar and the DMK.

{ BOOK ON R&AW } RETD ARMY OFFICER ON TRIAL

SC salvo to CBI on classified files in OSA case

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court recently directed the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) to decide within a month whether to provide "sensitive" documents to a retired Army officer facing trial under the Official Secrets Act (OSA) for exposing alleged irregularities within the Research and Analysis Wing (R&AW) in a book published in 2007.

In a hearing on Friday, the top court said confidentiality cannot be grounds to deny the veteran these documents if they are the basis for prosecuting him under OSA. A bench of justices JK Maheshwari and Atul S Chandurkar said: "If you (CBI) are using the documents against him, you cannot say they are confidential. You find a way out without invit-

ing an order from this court." The court was hearing a petition filed by Major General (retd) VK Singh who blew the lid off the irregularities within the R&AW in his book "India's External Intelligence - Secrets of Research and Analysis Wing (RAW)" published soon after his retirement in 2007.

Singh's lawyer Suroor Mander pointed out that the documents are crucial to his defence. "My cli-

ent seeks 12 documents and statements by four witnesses." She pointed out that the trial court ruled in their favour and directed that a copy of each document be provided under some conditions. But the Delhi high court reversed that ruling, citing that confidentiality permitted only inspection of the documents, Mander said.

"Why are you not permitting him the documents?" the bench asked CBI, represented in court by additional solicitor general (ASG) Davinder Pal Singh.

The ASG said, "There is sensitivity attached to these documents. They are interested only in knowing which documents they are. The high court has allowed inspection, which serves their purpose."

The matter will be taken up next on April 10. The court told CBI, "Our inten-

tion is to ensure that a person implicated by certain documents is not deprived of that same material." CBI requested the matter be taken up after four weeks to obtain instructions. Mander requested a stay of the trial, which the bench did not consider necessary since CBI was represented in these proceedings.

CBI registered the case against Singh in September 2007 accusing him of revealing secret information that jeopardised the security of the nation. In April 2008, the Centre gave the authorisation for filing a charge sheet under OSA. In 2009, the trial court took cognisance of the charge sheet under sections 3 and 5 of OSA dealing with "spying" and "wrongful communication" besides other offences of criminal breach of trust by public servant and criminal conspiracy under the IPC.

In a first, woman officer to take over as superintendent of Srinagar Central Jail — once home to militants, separatists

SRINAGAR: For the first time, a woman officer has been appointed as the superintendent of Srinagar Central Jail, one of the Union Territory's oldest prisons, which once housed several high-profile inmates, including militants and political prisoners.

According to an official order issued on Monday evening, four officials were posted as superintendents to different jails in

Jammu and Kashmir. Saba Shawl, a 2012 batch official, was assigned responsibility for the Srinagar Central Jail.

Before her latest posting, Shawl was posted as the Staff Officer, Director General of Prisons J&K. She has also served as a public relations officer in the J&K Prisons department.

Saba's transfer was issued through an order No. 145-Home of 2026 dated March 2.

A resident of posh Pir Bagh locality in Srinagar, Shawl

holds a master's degree in social work and cleared the prestigious Kashmir Public Service Commission examination in 2012.

Officers who know her said that Shawl is well versed in her job. "She holds tremendous experience, though it will be a challenging job for her but she knows the department very well," an officer said, who asked not to be named.

Central Jail Srinagar is the oldest jail in the UT with its building bearing signs of age

and decay. It houses more than 900 prisoners, including several political prisoners and is well guarded not only by the police but also by CISF.

The jail has been in the news in the past after raids were carried out in the prison and phones were recovered from the prisoners. In the past, the jail has housed foreign militants and top separatist leaders.

However, most of them have been shifted to another high-profile jail in the UT, such as Kot Balwal, Jammu.

Can AI assessments enable better learning

For India to turn its demographic promise into an economic reality and thrive in an AI world, the Viksit Bharat dream must be rooted in what happens inside classrooms. Yet national assessments show a persistent learning crisis: barely 45% of Grade-5 children can read at a Grade-2 level and only about 31% can perform simple division. These sobering numbers show that a systemic rethink is needed; more of the same won't do. The solution can start from a simple premise: teachers should spend their time and energy on teaching, and the entire ecosystem should enable that. Pairing this philosophy with rigorous, frequent outcome measurement – which in turn informs immediate classroom action – can help teachers teach the right competencies at the right learning levels. This is the essence of the "Assessment-to-Action" approach: Assess comprehensively (all competencies), universally (every child) and accurately, at regular intervals, without increasing teacher burden. Close the loop for the teacher by converting assessment data into personalized, competency-linked, student-specific teaching next steps and nudges. Use the same assessment data as the single source of truth for all other stakeholders – from parents to policy makers.

Let's look at Rajasthan as a case study. The Rajasthan School Education Department has pioneered the Assessment-to-Action system, conducting AI-based assessments of around 40 lakh students in Grades 3 to 8, two to three times a year since 2023. Under this model, teachers take a photo of students' answer sheets on a mobile phone, after

which an AI algorithm – (developed by PlayPower Labs) digitizes and corrects responses with over 96% accuracy. Based on the results, teachers receive personalized recommendations and nudges on which competencies to reteach, which students to focus on, along with competency-linked lesson plans, bite-sized videos, worksheets and more. The end-to-end experience runs on the department-owned Shikshak app.

Early results are compelling. Within two academic years, the number of districts with more than 50% of students behind grade level fell from 18 to five. Teachers report substantial time savings – correction time has dropped from 5-6 minutes per child to under a minute. They also appreciate the specificity and usability of the feedback, and how it enables them make classroom action more intentional.

The state has also implemented AI-enabled Hindi reading assessments for 35 lakh students using a tool developed by Wadhvani AI. These voice-recognition models score fluency across dialects and accents and feed results into targeted reading campaigns such as Prakhari Rajasthan. The state has begun piloting AI-supported scoring of subjective assessments with PlayPower Labs; a study in Jodhpur shows promising results with over 90% accuracy – an important step toward assessing reasoning and written expression at scale. Practical lessons about AI in public education

Several other states – including Gujarat, Assam and Andhra Pradesh – are implementing AI-enabled digitization in different contexts, signaling a nationwide readiness to leverage AI in school education reform. These gains underscore three practical truths about AI in public educa-

tion. First, AI is most valuable when it automates routine, time-consuming tasks such as scoring, digitization and aggregation, so that teachers don't have to. Second, data matters only when something can be done with it. A closed loop that moves from assessment to insight (where to focus) to action (teaching aids) is what makes a useful tool. Third, success depends on state ownership and human-centered design. Tools that reduce teacher workload, align with curricula and are co-designed with educators are the ones that will be adopted and sustained.

Regular, reliable, census-based assessment data enables a system-wide focus on learning outcomes, giving policymakers a clearer view of what works and allowing decisions to be based on classroom needs.

One of the biggest benefits of this granular, census data is its predictive capacity: which students are at risk of dropping out, which interventions are improving outcomes, which schools need more support. These insights can make the social sector more evidence-led, data-driven and accountable.

Rajasthan's story offers a pragmatic blueprint not just for education but for other sectors too – showing how AI can be used to digitize outcomes at scale without increasing the burden on teachers, nurses or farmers. Only when children leave school with conceptual clarity and the habits of reading, reasoning and problem-solving can they become fully contributing citizens. The simple mantra – let teachers teach, let AI assess – may be the most radical and humble step towards a truly Viksit Bharat.

Rebuilding frayed ties

The outcomes of Mark Carney's New Delhi visit point to a welcome rebound in India-Canada relations

The process of resetting India-Canada relations, which began with PM Narendra Modi's meeting with his Canadian counterpart Mark Carney in June last year, has entered a new phase of consolidation. Carney's visit to New Delhi this week culminated in the signing of crucial agreements for cooperation in the mining and processing of rare earth minerals and long-term supply of uranium ore to fuel India's nuclear reactors. In line with Carney's call at the World Economic Forum for "middle powers" to come together to forge a new path in the face of great power hegemony, there was talk by the two sides of using trade and investments to shore up the rules-based order and to deepen security cooperation. The agreement on the supply of uranium ore marks a significant turning point since India had used plutonium derived from a reactor supplied by Canada for its first atomic test in 1974. The new Strategic Energy Partnership, which covers nuclear, LNG, solar and hydrogen, could play a key role in meeting India's growing energy needs in view of Canada's extensive gas and uranium reserves.

Modi's and Carney's remarks made it clear that both countries are determined to put the diplomatic row — triggered by former PM Justin Trudeau's comments about the killing of a Khalistani separatist in Canada in 2023 — behind them as they focus on concluding a free trade agreement by the end of this year and put in place new measures such as a defence dialogue to support maritime security cooperation and stability in the Indo-Pacific. In that context, Carney's visit and the rebound in India-Canada relations marked a moment of sanity amid widespread chaos on the global stage.

However, the shadow of the killing of Khalistani separatist Hardeep Singh Nijjar still hangs over the relationship, with leaks from the Canadian side leading to a media report that linked two Indian officials to the episode on the very day that Modi and Carney met. The two sides have decided to isolate such matters from the overall relationship by keeping them firmly within the purview of a security dialogue. More disclosures should be expected when the trial in the case begins later this year. New Delhi and Ottawa will do well to ensure there are adequate guardrails to cope with any further developments. The focus should remain on the more transformative aspects of the relationship, including trade and strategic cooperation.

Electing a post-uprising government in Nepal

Six months ago, Nepal's Gen Z stormed the streets and forced the government in Kathmandu to quit. The massive mobilisation built around social media, left the legacy political outfits, some of them with a record in battling the monarchy and even parliamentary forces, running for cover as the protests turned violent and targeted the ruling elite. At least 77 people died in the protests, and then Prime Minister, KP Sharma Oli, was forced to resign. The interim administration, headed by former Chief Justice of Nepal Sushila Karki, dissolved the House of Representatives and promised fresh elections. On Thursday, Nepal will vote to elect a new parliament. And, its youth — 42% of the population is in the 16-40 age bracket — will hold the key. History tells us that street mobilisations are successful in forcing out governments but less so in shaping electoral outcomes in progressive ways, as the Arab Spring showed. But Bangladesh, most recently, and Sri Lanka, last year, revealed mature electorates voting for political and economic stability.

In Thursday's election, over 60 political parties have fielded candidates for the 275 parliamentary seats (165 will be directly elected and 110 under the proportional representation system). Balendra Shah, a 35-year-old rapper-turned-Kathmandu mayor, is seemingly the Gen Z face, though he is currently aligned with the Rashtriya Swatantra Party. The leadership of Nepali Congress is now with a younger generation, which may help it in the hustings. The two main Communist parties — Oli's Communist Party of Nepal and Pushpa Kamal Dahal's CPN-UML — have chosen to ride out the storm rather than opt for an overhaul of personalities and policies. Nepal's political crisis and the street anger could be traced to divided electoral outcomes — no government in Kathmandu has completed a full term since 1990, and parties have had no qualms in forging coalitions of convenience, often betraying the mandate. A clear outcome in Thursday's polls may help the country avoid that trap and engage constructively with its restive youth.

The lessons from India's HPV vaccine programme

India is poised to roll out the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine for adolescent girls in the coming weeks. With this step, the country will incorporate all 13 antigens recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO) for national immunisation programmes. It is a milestone that signifies both culmination and transition — the completion of India's childhood immunisation basket, and a decisive shift towards recognising adolescence as a critical window for preventive health.

The HPV vaccine will also be the first in India's Universal Immunisation Programme to be offered exclusively to adolescents. Until now, national immunisation efforts have focused primarily on infants, young children, and pregnant women. This policy evolution signals a broader and more mature vision — one that acknowledges that prevention cannot, and should not, conclude in early childhood.

Yet, this imminent rollout is not merely an administrative development; it follows nearly 18 years of deliberation, controversy, and delay. The protracted interval between initial consideration and actual introduction offers instructive lessons for all public health initiatives.

The first HPV vaccine was licensed

globally in 2006 and became available in India by early 2008. During 2008-09, an HPV vaccine demonstration project — led by PATH, an international non-profit organisation, in collaboration with the Indian Council of Medical Research and the respective state governments — was launched in Andhra Pradesh and Gujarat. The objective was to generate empirical evidence on the feasibility, acceptability, coverage, and cost of delivering the vaccine in diverse settings, for possible induction into India's national vaccination program. Girls aged 10-14 years were vaccinated in Khammam district of Andhra Pradesh and Vadodra district of Gujarat, with different delivery models being tested.

However, reports of deaths among some vaccinated girls in 2009 triggered widespread alarm. Though subsequent investigations concluded that the fatalities were not causally linked to the vaccine, allegations of inadequate consent procedures and ethical lapses — particularly in vulnerable and tribal populations — fuelled public mistrust. The matter was vigorously debated in Parliament, became headline news, and, in 2010, the Union government suspended the project.

What ensued was a prolonged phase of policy inertia. HPV vaccination became enmeshed in wider debates concerning pharmaceutical influence, research ethics, and adolescent sexuality. Despite repeated recommendations from government-constituted but independent technical advisory bodies on immunisation, India refrained from inducting the HPV vaccine into its national programme. The episode demonstrated a sobering reality: Scientific evidence, however robust, is insufficient in the absence of public confidence.

The cost of this delay must be measured not merely in elapsed years but in forfeited opportunities. Entire cohorts of girls aged out of the optimal vaccination window. Meanwhile, many countries progressed with alacrity. By January 2026, around 164 countries had introduced the HPV vaccine and collectively administered over 500 million doses. Nations such as Australia and the UK are now on the cusp of eliminating cervical cancer as a public health problem, following sustained and comprehensive vaccination strategies.

In India, cervical cancer remains the second most common cancer among women, with an estimated 80,000 new cases and more than 42,000 deaths annually. Persistent infection with high-risk HPV types — particularly types 16 and 18 — accounts for the majority of these cancers. The vaccine slated for deployment in India, Gardasil, protects against HPV types 16 and 18, among others. HPV vaccines are non-live, incapable of causing infection, and have demonstrated impressive efficacy — ranging from 93% to 100% — in preventing cervical cancers attributable to vaccine-covered types. Since 2022, the WHO has endorsed a single-dose schedule for girls aged 9-14 years, enhancing affordability and programmatic feasibility. The global strategy aspires to achieve 90% vaccination coverage among girls by age 15, as part of a concerted effort to eliminate cervical cancer.

introduction by nearly 15 years offers several salient lessons.

First, communication must be intrinsic to programme design rather than relegated to an afterthought. Communities require lucid explanations of why a vaccine is being offered, how it functions, and what safeguards are in place. Data alone cannot substitute trust. Even coincidental adverse events can destabilise programmes if institutional responses appear opaque or defensive. Prompt, independent investigations and transparent disclosure are indispensable for sustaining credibility.

Second, ethical standards in public health interventions must be visibly demonstrable, particularly when programmes involve adolescents or marginalised communities. Perceptions of exploitation can eclipse scientific merit. The events of 2009 illustrate how fragile trust can be — and how arduous its restoration.

Third, prevention demands political consistency. Unlike outbreaks, the success of vaccination is measured in terms of diseases that fail to materialise. This very invisibility can engender complacency. Enduring commitment, rather than episodic enthusiasm, determines lasting impact.

The forthcoming HPV vaccination, being offered free, will promote equity across socioeconomic strata. However, we need to remember that vaccination alone will not suffice to eliminate cervical cancer. Screening — through Pap smears or HPV testing — must con-

tinue, particularly for older women who remain unvaccinated. A comprehensive strategy integrating vaccination, screening, and timely treatment offers the most efficacious path forward.

Simultaneously, India must broaden its preventive horizon. Historically, India's immunisation policy has focused on infants and pregnant women; institutionalising adult vaccination for high-risk groups and the elderly should constitute the next frontier of India's preventive health architecture.

India's decision to proceed with HPV vaccination is both a corrective and a forward-looking step. The delay in introduction serves as a reminder that scientific advancement can be impeded by mistrust, political contestation, and inadequate communication. Yet the eventual rollout also attests to institutional resilience and the capacity to learn from past missteps. If implemented with transparency, sustained political will, and meaningful community engagement, the HPV programme could emerge as another consequential public health achievement — shielding future generations of women from preventable malignancies and reaffirming the primacy of prevention in national health policy.

What lies ahead in the Iran-West Asia crisis

The assassination of Iran's Supreme Leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, in a joint strike by Israel and the US, underlined that the war aims have expanded beyond the issue of Iran acquiring nuclear capability to regime change. Iran has announced the formation of a three-member Guidance Council, including President Masoud Pezeshkian, head of the judiciary Mohsen Ejaei, and one jurist from the Guardian Council. The Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) has launched fresh missile attacks on Israel and the US bases in the region. US forces have suffered casualties; Abu Dhabi and Dubai airports have been hit. Iran has shown a continued capacity to prosecute the war.

The joint attack came a day after Oman's foreign minister Badr Al Busaidi told CBS that a "peace deal is within our reach". Military action has pre-empted a diplomatic solution. This was a repeat of the events of last June, when Israel attacked Iran in the middle of US-Iran negotiations.

The US-Iran indirect negotiations were taking place against the background of a major US military build-up in the region, which included two aircraft carriers — USS Abraham Lincoln and USS Gerald Ford. In his State of the Union address, he stressed that Iran cannot have nuclear weapons. The Iranian foreign minister had already given this assurance. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu defended Israeli actions as removing an "existential threat". Trump justified US actions in terms of defending the American people against "imminent danger" from Iran.

How serious was the Iranian threat? Iran started enriching uranium beyond the level permissible under the nuclear deal of 2015, only after Trump had withdrawn from the agreement negotiated by his predecessor. A day before the strike, Al Busaidi had disclosed that Iran had agreed not to stockpile its enriched uranium. Without this, it is not possible to build a bomb. He added that Iran's existing stockpile was to be diluted and converted into fuel. *The Wall Street* published an article citing a US intelligence agency that Iran did not have the missile capacity to threaten the American people.

The bombing campaign is predicated on the assumption that this will bring Iranian protesters to the streets again. The coming days will test this assumption. At the height of protests in December-January, Trump had said that "help is on the way". This did not materialise. The protests were driven by an external catalyst — the US sanctions. Continued sanctions and military intervention do not necessarily endear the US or Israel to the Iranian people.

Before the Israel-US strike, nine heads of Arab governments wrote to Trump advising against military action. Saudi Arabia and the UAE have stated that in case of war, their land and airspace will not be used. The IRGC Navy had also carried out exercises in the Hormuz Strait to demonstrate its ability to choke off the waterway that carries 20% of the global oil supply. The events since have demonstrated that military action

against Iran is bound to have major collateral

damage on the neighbouring countries.

There is no alternative source that can compensate for the loss of 20% of the global oil supply in case the Hormuz Strait is closed. Since the beginning of this month, the price of Brent crude, an international benchmark, has gone up by \$4.54 per barrel. After the war broke out, it jumped further by \$5.59 per barrel. A one-dollar increase in crude oil price, if sustained, would translate into an increase of India's annual crude import bill by ₹14,000 crore. Apart from crude oil, the supply of liquefied natural gas (LNG) will also be affected in case of a flare-up in the Gulf. Fifty-five percent of India's LNG supplies traverse the Hormuz Strait. An oil tanker in the Hormuz Strait has been set ablaze. The ARAMCO refinery in Saudi Arabia has been hit. Qatar Energy has halted LNG production following an attack on one of its facilities. In case of any further attacks on oil infrastructure or shipping, there will be a sharper increase.

As the Indian ambassador to Iran, I had the privilege of negotiating the agreement for Indian participation in Chabahar port. However, at this stage, no development is possible. The project will remain important to us for future access to Afghanistan. Iran is the critical link to shorter access to Russia and Central Asia through the International North-South Transit Corridor (INSTC).

The first Gulf War to liberate Kuwait from Iraqi occupation was a war of necessity. The second Gulf War in 2002 was a war of choice. Though the military outcome was decided quickly in America's favour, instability continued for more than a decade, draining America's treasury and costing thousands of casualties to the US Army. It also led to the rise of ISIS. The governments in Baghdad were not necessarily of America's choice.

Widening the war aim to regime change has made it difficult for the US to climb down without losing face. It could trap America in an open-ended conflict. President Trump has mentioned that the war could continue for up to four weeks. Will this be enough to bring about regime change or force Iran to accept US-Israeli terms?

Iran's position has hardened. It is time to step back from the brink, accept an immediate ceasefire, and return to the negotiating table. Three rounds of negotiations between Iran and the US made progress and can be built upon. Under the nuclear deal of 2015, only the secondary US sanctions were removed. Lifting of all US sanctions could allow participation of American companies in Iran's oil and gas sectors.

The next step could be a conference to discuss regional security with the participation of all countries, including Israel. A cooperative framework is always preferable to forever wars.

Why China must opt for lower growth targets

China achieved a \$1.19 trillion trade surplus in 2025 — 20% higher than in 2024 — helping meet its 5% growth target. It needs a large trade surplus for sustained economic growth because other sectors of the economy cannot meaningfully contribute to economic growth in 2026 and beyond.

There is broad agreement within China's leadership that the "old economy" or the traditional investment and export-driven growth model/strategy is no longer politically and economically viable. Non-productive investment in infrastructure and manufacturing and rising government spending have fuelled high debt levels, while declining returns on capital since 2008 have prompted further capital injections, deepening financial pressures.

The capital required to drive economic growth in China has nearly doubled since the Covid-19 outbreak in 2020, reflecting the increasingly debt-dependent nature of GDP expansion.

Increasing debt levels tend to suppress economic growth by introducing uncertainty about the allocation of future servicing costs. While this can culminate in a debt crisis, China is more likely to encounter extended periods of low growth, comparable to the stagnation seen in the erstwhile Soviet Union after the early 1960s and in Japan following the early 1990s.

China needs higher domestic consumption, but growth in spending has remained limited despite government measures. Retail sales recorded a modest 0.9% rise in December 2025 — the slowest pace since 2022. While the government has committed to proactive measures in 2026 to restore confidence, structural weaknesses in the economy persist.

The contraction in consumption stems not only from the property downturn and falling housing prices but also from wider economic fragility and high youth unemployment of around 20%. The real estate sector, contributing about 15% of GDP, remains in prolonged downturn, with large volumes of unsold property depressing prices. As household wealth declines due to falling property prices, consumers have become increasingly cautious, and continued weakness in the sector is likely to further dampen confidence and spending.

After Covid-19, confidence in government policy has eroded and consumer spending has weakened as people grow more pessimistic about the economy. China is experiencing price stagnation, while employers are reducing wages as workers accept lower pay in an increasingly competitive labour market. Consumers are delaying purchases in anticipation of better

deals, which in turn encourages firms to further cut prices. This dynamic raises the risk of a deflationary cycle that could force business closures and slow economic growth.

The "new economy" focused on high-tech innovation, green energy, and digital services under the aegis of President Xi Jinping's Made in China 2025 initiative — launched in 2015 — is also not going to lead to higher economic growth. While high-technology industries are expanding, they are suffering from low profitability due to intense competition and heavy reliance on local/provincial government support. Declining profits, a "race to the bottom," and excess capacity — where supply outpaces demand — have pushed many Chinese firms to rely on exports for survival. At the same time, excessive competition is forcing companies to scale back or shut down operations, contributing to rising unemployment. Government subsidies and financial assistance are also increasing local debt burdens, which are likely to weigh on future economic growth.

According to data from China's National Bureau of Statistics, the "new economy" remains too small to offset the slowdown in the "old economy", contributing only about 20% of GDP growth. Rhodium Group estimates suggest that during 2023-2025, the contraction in output from the "old economy" was roughly six times greater than the gains generated by the "new economy".

China's economy will continue to expand at a lower rate because of the problems in the old economy and the inability of the new economy to compensate for the former's slowdown. This necessitates increasing exports and trade surplus. The size of China's trade surplus plays a crucial role in determining debt accumulation, as it offsets the need for non-productive investment to sustain GDP growth. Higher trade surplus reduces the share of inefficient spending in the economy, whereas a lower surplus intensifies reliance on debt-driven investment.

However, burgeoning exports and a massive trade surplus are not sustainable in an increasingly uncertain trade environment. Rising protectionism globally and push back by countries against China's distorted mercantilist trade policies will also hinder exports. Beijing should accept lower economic growth and fix lower annual growth targets, more in line with the growth capacity of the economy.

Global mkts tumble amid oil price spike

The dollar climbed against euro, sterling and yen; bitcoin fell 1.35% to \$68,496.40 while gold declined

NEW YORK/LONDON: Stock indexes around the world tumbled and government bonds rose with the dollar on Tuesday, as a widening conflict in the Middle East pushed oil prices up sharply for a second straight day and exacerbated investor concerns about inflation.

US crude oil prices jumped more than 7% along with Brent as the war, started over the weekend, intensified with Israel attacking Lebanon, and Iran responding with strikes against energy infrastructure in Gulf countries and tankers in the Strait of Hormuz, through which a fifth of the world's oil and liquefied natural gas typically passes.

Wall Street indexes were down nearly 2%, following European stocks' more than 3% loss after MSCI's Asia Pacific index closed down 3.5%. South Korea led the decline in Asian markets on Tuesday, with a weaker won helping to send the KOSPI down 7.2%. "The market is concerned that the US is getting pulled deeper into this conflict than investors had expected with the closure of the Strait of Hormuz and increased risk of broader and longer regional instability," said Tim Chruskey, senior portfolio strategist at Ingalls & Snyder in New York. "The administration is pulling us into a conflict where historically, issues last and last. We could get pulled in even deeper."

And rising oil prices raise concerns about inflation, Chruskey said: "It will send energy stocks higher but it is a negative to the global economy."

On Tuesday at 11:32am, the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 904.58 points, or 1.85%, to 48,000.20, the S&P 500 fell 118.38 points, or 1.73%, to 6,762.65 and the Nasdaq Composite fell 415.20 points, or 1.82%, to 22,333.66.

MSCI's gauge of stocks across the globe was down 25.73 points, or 2.45%, to 1,024.10 while the pan-European STOXX 600 index fell 3.18%. After paring some gains, Cboe's Volatility index, also known as Wall Street's fear gauge, was up 3.6 points at 25.06 after rising as high as 28.15, which was its highest level since November 20.

Meanwhile, government bond markets from the euro zone to

the United States and Britain sold off sharply on concerns that sustained higher inflation would likely force central banks to turn more hawkish.

US Treasury yields rose sharply for a second straight session with the benchmark US 10-year note's yield up 1.3 basis points at 4.065%, from 4.052% late on Monday. The 30-year bond yield rose 0.9 basis points to 4.7078% and the 2-year note yield, which typically moves in step with interest rate expectations for the Federal Reserve, rose 2.1 basis points to 3.508%.

Dollar rises against Euro
In currencies, the US dollar climbed to multi-month peaks against the euro, sterling and yen as the Middle East conflict triggered broad demand for safe-haven assets and fuelled expectations of prolonged global inflation.

The dollar index, which measures the greenback against a basket of currencies including the yen and the euro, rose 0.78% to 99.27, with the euro down 0.86% at \$1.1586. Against the Japanese yen, the dollar strengthened 0.29% to 157.8 and sterling weakened 0.76% to \$1.3303.

In cryptocurrencies, bitcoin fell 1.35% to \$68,496.40.

In oil markets, US crude rose 7.57% to \$76.62 a barrel and Brent rose to \$83.43 per barrel, up 7.25% on the day. It touched the \$85 level earlier in the day.

Adding to energy supply uncertainties, Qatar had halted its production of liquefied natural gas (LNG) on Monday, prompting precautionary shutdowns of oil and gas facilities across the Middle East. Qatari LNG production makes up about 20% of global supply.

The surge in energy prices also complicates the Federal Reserve's efforts to keep inflation under control, with policymakers already showing signs of division around the impact of artificial intelligence on the US economy. The US will take action to mitigate rising energy prices due to the spike in the price of oil, Secretary of State Rubio said.

Oil inflation concerns came as ISM manufacturing data released on Monday showed US activity grew steadily in February, but a gauge of factory gate prices raced to a near 3-1/2-year high amid tariffs, already highlighting upside pressure on inflation even before the attacks on Iran. In precious metals, gold prices were weighed down by a stronger dollar and fading prospects of an interest rate cut as inflation concerns intensified. Spot gold fell 4.01% to \$5,113.22 an ounce. US gold futures fell 4.63% to \$5,049.30 an ounce.

War threatens supply chain disruptions for agri mkts

WASHINGTON: Agriculture traders rushed to adjust positions with the escalating conflict threatening to disrupt supply chains from corn and soybean meal to fertiliser and sugar. President Donald Trump said the US bombing campaign against Iran could last for weeks. The conflict is already reverberating across the Middle East and putting a squeeze on the Strait of Hormuz, a strategic waterway for the global oil trade and other commodities.

On Monday, soybean oil surged as much as 3.9% to hit a two-and-a-half year high, following steep gains in crude oil that are expected to make renewable fuels made from agricultural feedstocks such as soybeans and corn more attractive.

Soybeans
The attack on Iran also shakes US relations with China, which has condemned the strikes. The conflict imperils an upcoming meeting in China between Trump and Chinese president Xi Jinping and throws into question whether the Asian nation — the world's top

consumer of soybeans — will continue securing supplies of the key US crop. "If the Iranian war is ongoing in late March, it will be politically difficult for Xi to host Trump in Beijing," AgResource Co. said in a note. "The political ties between the US/China are fraying, which at minimum will delay China's purchase of US soybeans, and could derail it."

Soybean meal
Soybean meal dropped as much as 2.7%, the most since November, with Iran a key importer of the protein-rich animal feed. Prices were also under pressure "due to expanding US production and rising freight rates that could dent future US soy meal export sales," AgResource said.

Wheat
Wheat fell as much as 2.8%, giving back a portion of last week's steep gains as traders waited to see if grain shipments would be affected by the conflict. Investors had rushed to cover short bets on potential upheaval from a US intervention in Iran. "Wheat was the leader last

week with aggressive short-covering taking place," StoneX risk management consultant Matt Campbell said in a note. "While the impacts on wheat's supply and demand in an Iranian conflict are not overly high, the managed money wanted to be on the sidelines while it was taking place."

Corn
Corn markets are focusing on potential disruptions from the conflict for supplies out of Brazil, the world's second largest exporter of the grain. Iran is the top buyer of Brazilian corn, accounting for roughly 22% of shipments last year.

Sugar
Volume in the sugar market rose as speculators covered short positions, reacting to higher energy prices, according to Mike McDougall, an analyst at McDougall Global View. Sugar is also used in biofuel production and demand can get a boost when crude moves higher. The premium that refined sugar carries over the raw variety also jumped.

PAK CLOSES CERTAIN AIR ROUTES FOR MILITARY DRILLS AS WAR IN WEST ASIA INTENSIFIES

LAHORE/ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has closed certain routes within Karachi and Lahore Flight Information Regions (FIRs) at specific times for the military exercises involving fighter jets of the Pakistan Air Force (PAF) in view of the evolving regional situation, a spokesperson for the Pakistan Airports Authority (PAA) said, PTI reported.

This could impact airlines using Pakistani airspace to travel towards the West. Meanwhile, Pakistani airspace has been closed for Indian airlines since the conflict with India in May last year.

"The PAA on Monday issued a NOTAM announcing the closure of certain routes within the Karachi and Lahore Flight Information Regions (FIRs) at specific times," the spokesperson said in a statement.

According to the notification, these air routes will remain unavailable for commercial operations from March 3 to March 31, between 9am and 3pm daily.

Pakistan says it killed 67 Afghan security forces

Afghanistan's ground forces attacked Pakistan's military positions at 16 locations along the southwestern border early Tuesday and fired on multiple points in the northwest, triggering intense clashes in which 67 Afghan security force members and one Pakistani soldier were killed, as fighting between the two neighbours entered its fifth consecutive day, AP reported.

Pakistan "successfully repelled these multiple attacks" along the Afghan border, Information Minister Attaullah Tarar said. Afghan forces carried out ground assaults in 16 locations in the southwestern districts of Qilla Saifullah, Nushki and Chaman in Balochistan province, Tarar said on X.

China showing few signs it will directly supply arms to Iran

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump's assault on Iran has killed the country's supreme leader and left it burning through missiles, but there's little sign Tehran can count on Beijing to bolster its defences.

Reports have swirled in recent months of Chinese air defence systems destined for Iran alongside claims China is shipping missile propellant ingredients to the Islamic Republic, although neither side has publicly commented. After Trump's strike, China's Foreign Ministry dismissed a separate account that Beijing was poised to arm Iran with supersonic anti-ship missiles as "not true".

So far, there isn't any evidence from the battlefield that Chinese weapons have been deployed, a contrast with the recent Thai-Cambodia border war and India-Pakistan conflict. President Xi Jinping has limited China's public support to condemning the US for attacking Tehran, which supplies about 13% of its seaborne crude.

"It's hard to say China is a major arms supplier to Iran, but it does supply dual-use tech," said Yang Zi, research fellow at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies. "China is limited by sanctions as well as considerations over its ties with Sunni Gulf states and Israel."

The Pentagon warned in a report last year that China's defence relationship with Iran is now focused on Chinese com-

panies selling dual-use components for Iran's ballistic missile and drone programmes.

After the International Atomic Energy Agency in September 2005 said Iran was not complying with the Non-Proliferation Treaty, the United Nations Security Council — including China — unanimously adopted a resolution that established a de facto embargo on the export to and import from Iran of certain items and technology potentially related to nuclear weapons.

China officially stopped selling weapons to Iran after 2005. Before that Beijing supplied a range of missiles, aircraft and artillery to Iran, according to the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute.

Direct weapon sales from China to Iran are also deterred by US sanctions. The supply of Chinese dual-use items, however, provides a cover of deniability in line with Beijing's play-book for Russia.

Over the past eight years, more than 100 Chinese and Hong Kong entities have been added to the US Entity List for assisting Iran's export control evasion efforts, according to a report last November by the US-China Economic and Security Review Commission.

While China is now the world's fourth-largest arms exporter, Beijing has avoided selling arms to countries sanctioned by the US. That includes its "no-limits" partner Russia, although the Asian nation has continued to sell Moscow dual-use components.

Indian-American student among 4 killed in Texas

WASHINGTON: A 21-year-old Indian-American student is among four killed in a shooting outside a bar in Austin that is being investigated as a possible act of terrorism, PTI reported.

Heightened security concerns have emerged across the country after attacks on Iran this weekend by the United States and Israel, and retaliation by Iran.

Savitha Shan, an Austin native and a dual-degree senior at the University of Texas at Austin, was fatally shot when a gunman opened fire in a crowded enter-

tainment district on West Sixth Street on Sunday.

She was months away from graduation and was described by university officials as an outstanding student leader studying management information systems and economics.

The identities of the two persons who died at the scene of the shooting have been confirmed by Chief Lisa Davis of the Austin police at a news conference on Monday afternoon. They are Ryder Harrington, 19, and Shan.

According to a US intelligence assessment, Iran and its proxies could target the US with attacks in response to the Saturday killing of

Department of Homeland Security said Iran and its proxies "probably" pose a threat of targeted attacks on the United States, although a large-scale physical attack was unlikely.

A spokesman for the University of Texas at Austin confirmed Shan was a student at the school and said her legal last name was Shanumsundaram, according to school records, the New York Times reported. Texas university president, Jim Davis, described Shan in a letter to campus as "a child of loving parents. A loyal friend to many. A Longhorn preparing to change the world". Shan was a graduate of the Lib-

eral Arts and Science Academy and was widely regarded as a high-achieving and community-oriented student.

Federal authorities, led by the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force, are investigating the attack for possible international or ideological links. The suspect, identified as 53-year-old Ndiaga Diagne, a naturalised US citizen originally from Senegal, was killed by police at the scene. Investigators said materials recovered from the scene and the suspect's residence included an Iranian flag and extremist writings, prompting authorities to examine the possibility of self-radicalised terrorism.

Inside the US-Israeli plan to kill Khamenei

NEW DELHI/TEHRAN: Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, 86, was killed in an airstrike on Saturday, part of the US-Israel intelligence operation, which was years in the making, the Financial Times (FT) has reported.

According to the FT report which cited multiple sources, Israel spent years hacking Tehran's traffic cameras and gaining access to mobile phone networks to monitor the movements of Khamenei and his security detail. Nearly all traffic cameras in Tehran had been hacked for years, with footage encrypted and transmitted to servers. The hack allowed the Israeli and American forces to pinpoint Khamenei's location leading to his elimination in a targeted strike on Saturday, ANI reported.

An Israeli intelligence official told FT that long before the bombs fell, "we knew Tehran like we know Jerusalem". "And when you know a place as well as you know the street you grew up on, you notice a single thing that's out of place," the official added.

Advanced algorithms supplemented intelligence files on the personnel guarding top Iranian officials, compiling information such as home addresses, work schedules, commuting routes and — crucially — which officials they were typically tasked with protecting. The result was what intelligence professionals describe as a "pattern of life".

The above formed part of a long-running intelligence effort that ultimately set the stage for the assassination of Khamenei. This real-time stream of surveillance — one among hundreds of intelligence sources — was not the sole method Israel

mobile phone towers near Pasteur Street, causing calls to appear as if lines were busy and preventing Khamenei's security team from receiving potential warnings, the FT reported.

When US and Israeli intelligence determined that Khamenei would be holding a Saturday morning meeting at his office near Pasteur Street, officials viewed the opportunity to strike him alongside other senior leaders as especially advantageous.

They assessed that once open warfare fully unfolded, tracking such figures would grow far more difficult as Iranian officials retreated to hardened underground bunkers.

Tracking individuals once required labour-intensive confirmation and risked false identifications. In recent years, Israel's algorithm-driven intelligence infrastructure has largely automated that process.

stature, absolute certainty was required. Israeli doctrine mandates that two independent senior officers verify with high confidence both the presence of the target and the identities of those accompanying him, as per the FT report.

According to two people familiar with the matter cited in the report, Israeli intelligence drew on signals intelligence Unit 8200 — including compromised traffic cameras and infiltrated mobile networks — indicating the meeting was proceeding as scheduled.

US intelligence reportedly possessed an even more solid source: a human asset, both individuals said. The CIA declined to comment.

The US military cleared the path for Israeli fighter jets to bomb Khamenei's compound by launching cyber attacks "disrupting, degrading and blinding Iran's ability to see, communi-

cate and respond", the report quoted as saying General Dan Caine, chair of the US joint chiefs of staff.

Caine said the compound was struck in daylight following a "trigger event" carried out by the Israel Defence Forces (IDF) with US intelligence support.

Israeli aircraft, which had flown for hours to synchronise their arrival, released as many as 30 precision-guided munitions onto Khamenei's complex, according to a former senior Israeli intelligence official.

The Iranians were meeting for breakfast when they were killed, US President Donald Trump told Fox News.

The Israeli military said the timing offered a key benefit. "The decision to strike in the morning rather than at night allowed Israel to achieve tactical surprise for the second time, despite heavy Iranian preparedness," it stated.

FRANCE DEPLOYS JETS OVER UAE TO PROTECT ITS BASES

PARIS: France has deployed Rafale fighter jets over the United Arab Emirates to protect its naval and air bases against Iranian attacks, Foreign Minister Jean-Noel Barrot said on Tuesday. France has hundreds of navy, air force and army personnel based in the UAE. Its Rafale aircraft are stationed at Al-Dhafra base near Abu Dhabi. On Sunday, "a hangar at a French base in the United Arab Emirates was hit by a drone", Barrot said.

US 'HARDEST HITS' ON IRAN ARE STILL TO COME: RUBIO

WASHINGTON: Secretary of State Marco Rubio said the US military would step up its military attacks against Iran, a stark warning after two days of strikes across the country that the Trump administration says took out its leadership and crippled its ballistic-missile programme. "I'm not going to give away the details of our tactical efforts, but the hardest hits are yet to come from the US military," Rubio told reporters.

'10% OF GLOBAL FLEET CAUGHT IN HORMUZ BACKUP'

CALIFORNIA: Container ships account for roughly 100 of the

750 ships ensnared in the Strait of Hormuz backups following US and Israeli attacks on Iran, Jeremy Nixon, CEO of container carrier Ocean Network Express (ONE), said. "About 10% of the container ship global fleet is caught up in this," Nixon said at S&P Global Market Intelligence's TPM26 conference. "All of that cargo is going to start backing up" in shipping hubs and key ports in Europe and Asia, Nixon said. ONE and rival container carriers such as industry leader MSC have stopped booking cargo to the Middle East, said Nixon, who on July 11 is stepping down as CEO of ONE.

X HALTS REVENUE SHARING FOR A.I. WAR VIDEOS

WASHINGTON: Social media platform X announced on Tuesday it would suspend creators from its revenue sharing program for 90 days if they post AI-generated videos of armed conflicts without disclosing they were artificially made, it said.

The policy change, announced by an X executive on the Elon Musk-owned platform, targeted what the company described as a threat to information authenticity during wartime, as generative AI tools make it increasingly easy to produce misleading footage.

Old guard vs new leaders in Nepal's post-uprising polls

GUWAHATI: Nepal is gearing up for a very crucial election this week, the first after last September's violent youth-led uprising in Kathmandu and beyond — popularly called the Gen Z protest — led to the overthrow of the government. Voting for the Pratinidhi Sabha (house of representatives), the lower house of Nepal's parliament, will take place on March 5.

The election will pit well entrenched mainstream parties against a relatively new one that many believe could be the front runner. It will also decide whether the political careers of the old guard, who have been the most visible faces of Nepal's politics and government for decades, will remain relevant or a younger set of leaders will take charge.

"It's an unexpected and special election. Our constitution has no provision of snap polls, but it became necessary due to what happened in September. The formation of the interim government and dissolution of the parliament took place as special provisions which were not there in our constitution. The first expectation from this election is that it will bring the constitution on track," said Krishna Khanal, retired professor of political science in Tribhuvan University.

The Gen Z protest

What started as a peaceful protest by thousands of youths on the streets of Kathmandu on September 8 took a turn for the worse when police opened fire leading to 19 deaths and injuries to many others. While the protests were primarily against the government's move to ban 26 social media platforms, the greater demand was for a control on corruption, rule of law and good governance.

The next day youths turned up in far greater numbers and targeted important buildings in the capital such as the prime minister's office, the parliament, several key ministries, the Supreme Court and set on fire the offices of major political parties. They also assaulted a former prime minister and his

wife, who was foreign minister in the incumbent government. The fury spread outside the Kathmandu Valley as well with mobs targeting government offices, houses and businesses of prominent politicians. At some places, prisons were broken down leading to many criminals escaping. The violence resulted in the ouster of Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli.

Three days later, an interim government led by former chief justice, Sushila Karki, assumed office as the country's first woman prime minister. The protests had claimed 77 lives and left more than 2,300 injured.

"This election is different as it is being held in the backdrop of last year's protests seeking end to corruption, rule of law and good governance. After the interim government took charge, leaders of the protest signed an agreement with it on changes they want in Nepal. So, the new government will be under pressure to implement the deal," said Bipin Adhikari, professor of constitutional law in Kathmandu University.

Over 18.9 million voters will exercise the ballot on March 5 to elect 275 parliamentarians. Of them, 165 will get elected through direct voting while the rest 110 through proportional representation — parties will be allocated these seats based on the number of popular votes they get. There are 65 parties contesting the polls and over 3,400 candidates in the fray—

this time nearly 3,000 of them are below the age of 60.

Voting will start at 7am on Thursday and end at 5pm the same day. Counting will start immediately and the results of the 165 first-past-the-post seats will likely be declared within two to three days. Results for the remaining seats will take a few more days.

Ire against old parties

The Nepal Congress was headed by Sher Bahadur Deuba, a 79-year-old who had been prime minister on five occasions. KP Sharma Oli of CPN-UML was 74 and was prime minister for the third time before the protests forced him to quit. And the Maoists were headed by Pushpa Kamal Dahal (Prachanda), 71, who also held the Prime Minister's post thrice. The Nepalese youth were tired of them and wanted reform and change.

The protests had some effect. In October, Deuba was succeeded by Gagan Thapa, a 49-year-old parliamentarian with a mass appeal who will also be the party's prime ministerial candidate for this election. The party also brought in many young faces.

A former prime minister, Jhala Nath Khanal, whose house in Kathmandu was torched during the protests and his wife was set on fire will also not contest. Though Oli is still the president of CPN-UML, the party has also brought in new faces. The Leftist parties in Nepal

also made changes. In a rebranding exercise last November, several of these unified as the Nepali Communist Party (NCP). Prachanda was made the coordinator of the new outfit and another former prime minister, Madhav Kumar Nepal of Communist Party of Nepal-United Socialist, became the joint coordinator.

The party in focus

The Rastriya Swatantra Party (RSP), a party formed four years ago by a popular TV host, is in focus in this election. The centrist party contested the 2022 election and emerged as the fourth largest with 21 seats. It was also part of a coalition government for six months in 2024 with founder Rabi Lamichhane assuming the post of deputy prime minister.

The RSP is also in focus because of the entry of Balendra Shah, popularly known as Balen, into the party in December last year. A rapper and former mayor of Kathmandu, the 35-year-old was one of the prominent faces of the protests and was expected to become the interim prime minister. He is the RSP's prime ministerial candidate and will take on Oli in Jhapa. Shah and his party attracted large crowds during campaigning which ended on Monday and is said to be the front runner. "RSP is being seen as the party to beat in this election. But there's been some progress made by Nepali Congress, which is strong as ever and has brought in young faces. The CPN-UML is also gaining some ground. It is difficult to say who will come out on top but RSP, Nepali Congress, CPN-UML and NCP are likely to become the top four parties," said Adhikari.

The election will also decide the fortunes of old parties like Rastriya Prajatantra Party (RPP), which wants a return of the monarchy, and several smaller players from the Terai-Madhes region which borders India. Though these parties might not make a big impact, they could play a role in government formation if no single party manages to secure the 138 seats needed to form government.

RAXAUL/BIRGANJ: As Nepal heads into another crucial election, the mood on the streets reflects a mix of hope, frustration and cautious optimism. In the bustling marketplaces of Parsa and Bara districts in Nepal's Terai region — which account for eight of Nepal's parliamentary seats — unemployment, cost of essential goods and political instability dominate conversations as voters prepare to cast their ballots.

However, no single party appears dominant in the two Terai districts. "You cannot run the government by emotions and tearing down all the established institutions. We need a matured political party and political will to lead a country," said Saraj Chaurasia, 38, a resident of Sedhwa village in Parsa district.

Voter fatigue is also palpable. "We want leaders who stay accountable for five years, not five months and provide corruption free and good governance," said a shopkeeper in Birganj.

Meraj Alam, a younger voter from Bara district favours a change in the guard. In Parsa, former Birgunj mayor Vijay Sarawagi believes that the impact of the "Gen Z protest" has fizzed out. "There is no one major issue for which the people are looking to cast their vote. The Gen Z protest looks to have lost its sheen during the interim government," says Sarawagi.

In tea stalls across the two districts and along the highways that connect to Kathmandu and other parts of the hills, cost of daily essentials and migration of youths to India often crop up in conversation. "We want political stability which is only cornerstone of growth and development," said Madhav Rajpal, a Birgunj-based businessman.

Florida universities freeze H-1B hiring

MIAMI: Florida's public university system, one of the nation's largest, froze hiring via H-1B visas, emulating a move by Texas to restrict a programme that's become a focal point for President Donald Trump's broader immigration crackdown.

The Board of Governors that oversees Florida's 12 public universities voted 14-to-2 to not hire any candidates who need such visas this year and study whether their past use had disadvantaged US workers. Florida Governor Ron DeSantis ordered the board to end the practice in October, claiming universities were using them to replace US citizens. The board members who voted against the measure said it would hurt Florida's ability to attract the best talent. "This sends a message to people looking at Florida that this is not a place where they can come to work," said Carson Dale, a board member who represents the system's 430,000 students and voted against the proposal.

DeSantis said in October that "universities across the country

are importing foreign workers on H-1B visas instead of hiring Americans."

Florida's decision followed a similar move by Texas. The H-1B programme, one of the primary vehicles for bringing skilled, white-collar workers into the country, has been a focus of the administration's crackdown on immigration that includes initiatives aimed at expanding border enforcement and deportations.

In September, Trump issued a proclamation that imposed a new, \$100,000 fee on H-1B applications and prioritised higher-paid applicants. Florida's public universities sought H-1B visas for 600 employees in fiscal 2025, according to US Citizenship and Immigration Services. Across the US, colleges apply for thousands of H-1B visas each year, mainly for laboratories, engineering programs, medical research centers and high-tech fields like artificial intelligence. According to the National Center for Science and Engineering Statistics, just over half of US postdoctoral researchers in the health, engineering and science fields had H-1B or other temporary visas as of 2023.

TRUMP TOLD ME OF 'SOME GREAT TIMES' WITH EPSTEIN: CLINTON

WASHINGTON: Former President Bill Clinton told lawmakers that President Donald Trump told him he had "some great times" with convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein before their relationship soured, according to a video released on Monday.

In a videotaped deposition to the House of Representatives Oversight Committee, Clinton said under oath that Trump brought up Epstein at a golf tournament in 2002 or 2003.

"Somehow he knew I had flown in Epstein's aircraft," Clinton said. "He said, 'You know, we had some great times together over the years, but we fell out all because of a real estate deal.' Trump has said the relationship soured after Epstein hired young women who worked at Trump's Mar-a-Lago club.

OPENAI CHANGING PENTAGON DEAL, SAYS SAM ALTMAN

BENGALURU: OpenAI Chief Executive Sam Altman said on Monday that the ChatGPT-maker is working with the US Department of Defense to make some changes in their agreement.

"We have been working with the DoW (Department of War) to make some additions in our agreement to make our principles very clear," Altman said in a post on X.

Altman said one of the additions to the deal states that the Pentagon has affirmed OpenAI services will not be used by Department of War intelligence agencies (for example, the NSA). Any services to those agencies would require a follow-on modification to our contract. Last week, the AI firm announced a deal to deploy technology in the Defence Department's classified network.

Govt sets up task force as West Asia conflict threatens cargo shipments

NEW DELHI: The government has constituted an inter-ministerial group (IMG) to ensure India's supply chain resilience amid the war in West Asia, Union commerce and industry minister Piyush Goyal said on Tuesday.

"Today, a consultation meeting was held with all stakeholder ministries, key logistics and trade facilitation partners to review the emerging geopolitical situation and its potential impact on India's Exports and Imports," he said in a post on X.

The government's readiness to facilitate trade operations was reiterated through measures such as procedural flexibility in export-related authorisations, coordination with customs and port authorities to ensure smooth clearance, and engagement with financial and insurance institutions to safeguard exporter interests, he said.

"In this context, the Inter-Ministerial Group (IMG) for Supply Chain Resilience' has been created, comprising members from Department of Financial Services, Ministry of External Affairs, Ministry of Shipping, Ports & Waterways, Ministry of

Petroleum & Natural Gas and Central Board of Indirect Taxes & Customs, to facilitate effective coordination, monitoring and follow-up," he said.

"Government under PM @NarendraModi ji's leadership remains firmly committed to enabling a stable and responsive trade environment for our traders and exporters, safeguarding their interests and ensuring seamless operations," he added.

The ministry had on Monday convened an interdepartmental meeting along with other stakeholders to assess the emerging situation regarding both exports and imports. "Stakeholders presented an assessment of the evolving operational environment, including routing and transit-time changes, vessel scheduling adjustments, container/equipment availability, freight and insurance cost

trends, and implications for time-sensitive exports," the ministry said in a statement.

"The discussions covered the need to maintain predictability in cargo movement, minimise avoidable delays, and ensure seamless documentation and payment processes for exporters and importers," it said. The meeting was chaired by commerce department's special secretary Suchindra Misra and director general of foreign trade (DGFT) Lav Agarwal and was attended by representatives from logistics operators and shipping lines, the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC), the Department of Financial Services (DFS), the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and ministries of petroleum, ports, shipping and waterways. Officials of export promotion bodies were also present in the meeting.

The commerce department reiterated the government's priority of ensuring continuity of export-import (EXIM) logistics and mitigating any disruptions to India's trade flows, the ministry said in the statement. "It was emphasised that the approach will remain facilitative and coordinated, with a focus on maintaining supply chain resilience,

protecting the interests of exporters—particularly MSMEs—with a view that essential imports required for domestic production and consumption are not adversely affected," it said.

During the meeting it was agreed by the stakeholders to maintain close, real-time coordination for monitoring route and capacity developments, surcharges, and equipment availability, it said. Mechanisms for facilitation of time-sensitive export segments such as perishables, pharmaceuticals, and high-value manufactured exports were also discussed. The meeting emphasised strengthening facilitation at ports and ensuring smooth cargo evacuation to avoid congestion and extended dwell times, it said.

"The Government reiterated its readiness to facilitate trade operations, including, procedural flexibility in export-related authorisations in cases of genuine disruption; coordination with customs authorities to ensure smooth clearance; engagement with financial and insurance institutions to support exporter interests; and continued inter-ministerial coordination," the statement said.

ALUMINIUM RALLIES AS IRAN CRISIS PROMPTS QATAR TO HALT OUTPUT

Aluminium jumped after Qatar's state-owned energy producer said it would halt output of the metal as the Iran war throttles supply lines for smelters throughout the Middle East.

Prices rallied as much as 3.8% in London before paring some gains. QatarEnergy halted the production of aluminium and some chemicals, as it grappled with the consequences of Iranian attacks that forced the shutdown of its major liquefied natural gas plant.

QatarEnergy holds a 50% stake in Qatalum, a major regional joint-venture partner Norsk Hydro ASA. Hydro subsequently said the specific implications for aluminium production at Qatalum are currently unclear and Hydro is seeking to obtain more information.

Aluminium has bucked a broader downturn in metals markets as the Iran crisis deepens, with traders focused on potential supply dislocations or production cuts in a region responsible for about 9% of global output.

Copper fell more than 2% in London amid steep losses in stocks, bonds and currencies as the widening war in Iran reverberates through global markets.

Iran has stepped up its response to US-Israeli attacks by targeting US allies, and President Donald Trump has said there is no fixed timeline for his military action. The State Department urged Americans to leave countries across the Middle East, citing "serious safety risks" amid dangers from the war.

Qatar's announcement adds to signs of growing stress for producers in the region and their customers in markets spanning Asia, Europe and the US.

PM Modi urges quality push to power exports



NEW DELHI: Rapid progress of the Indian economy is a major foundation for a Viksit Bharat, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Tuesday, reiterating the resolve to "build more, produce more, connect more" and emphasising "export more" by enhancing the quality of Indian products to take full benefit of the recently signed major free trade agreements (FTAs).

"India has signed free trade agreements with many countries. A huge avenue of opportunities has opened up for us. In such a situation, it is our responsibility not to compromise on quality. If we are to focus our maximum strength, intelligence, power, and understanding on one thing, then we must place a strong emphasis on quality. The quality of our products must meet global standards, and not only that, but even better [than the global standard]," he said while addressing the second edition of the budget webinar series, which focused on "Sustaining and Strengthening Economic Growth".

India is the fastest-growing major economy of the world. According to the National Statistics Office's (NSO) GDP numbers with revised base year released on February 27, the Indian economy is projected to grow by 7.6% in 2025-26, higher than the previous estimate of 7.4% under the old data series. Experts are optimistic that the high growth rate would be sustained because of several key FTAs concluded by India. In its latest edition of Economic Watch, EY said: "In the background of India's extensive bilateral trade agreements with other major economies or economic groups, India's medium-term prospects have brightened up. We estimate India's real GDP growth to be in the range of 6.8-7.2% in FY27."

Speaking at the EY Entrepreneur of the Year awards in Mumbai on February 25, Union com-

merce minister Piyush Goyal spoke about India's expanding global trade footprint as New Delhi concludes nine FTAs covering 38 nations, giving Indian businesses preferential access to nearly two-thirds of global trade. "These agreements will help Indian goods, services, agricultural and fisheries products, and labour-intensive sectors reach new markets, integrate into global value chains and enhance talent mobility," he said. India has recently concluded FTAs with several countries, such as Australia, the UAE, the UK, the EU, New Zealand and Oman, newly finalised a deal with the US and engaged with Canada and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC).

The Prime Minister on Tuesday pointed at these emerging opportunities and said: "To achieve this, we will have to study, research, and understand the needs of other countries and the expectations of their people. We need to study the preferences and comfort levels of people in other countries," he said, emphasising on the need to invest on innovation and quality. "Quality creates a golden opportunity for us in this competitive world today. We must manufacture user-friendly products to meet these needs. Only then will we be able to capitalise on these opportunities. With the free trade agreement now in place, this highway of development is ready for you," he said.

Gas regulator preps new storage plan as war blocks supplies

NEW DELHI: India's energy regulator is moving to plug a widening hole in the country's gas supply chain as the conflict in West Asia threatens supplies of natural gas that is vital to power, fertiliser and city gas distribution networks.

According to two people aware of developments, the Petroleum and Natural Gas Regulatory Board (PNGRB) is preparing to propose overground

storage facilities for natural gas near the country's existing LNG (liquefied natural gas) terminals—India currently has eight such terminals. The storage would be used for both commercial purposes and for strategic requirements during exigencies, they said. "PNGRB may propose the government to set up storage reserves for LNG, preferably near existing terminals to support India's growing demand at times of exigencies and ensure energy security," one of the two people said on the condition of

anonymity, adding that the regulator would approach the ministry of petroleum and natural gas to frame rules under the PNGRB Act.

The urgency follows a halt in tanker traffic through the Strait of Hormuz, which carries more than half of India's LNG imports, and a spike in prices of LNG after an attack on QatarEnergy's Ras Laffan complex on Monday.

The move assumes significance considering India imports 55% of its gas requirement and holds barely 20 days of inven-

tory—including supplies in transit. In terms of LNG, India has stocks of up to 21 days, the officials said. Natural gas imports stood at \$14.9 billion in FY25, according to data from Petroleum Planning and Analysis Cell, of which Qatar's share was about 50%. According to government data, natural gas accounts for about 7% of India's energy basket and the government aims to take it to 15% by 2030.

Another person said the regulator was of the view that a surcharge may be imposed on the

usage of gas to fund construction of the reserves. "The surcharge would support the capex (capital expenditure) and do away with the need for viability gap funding for such projects," the second person said, also requesting anonymity. This person added that overground storage facilities would require a shorter construction period and lower capex compared to underground salt cavern-based strategic reserves.

Queries emailed to the regulator remained unanswered till press time.

India-Japan talks on rare earths advance

NEW DELHI: Japan is in talks with India to jointly explore rare earth deposits in the desert state of Rajasthan, two people familiar with the discussions said, as Tokyo seeks to reduce reliance on China for supplies critical to magnet manufacturing.

Last month, India's mines minister G. Kishan Reddy said three hard rock rare earth deposits containing 1.29 million tonnes (mt) of rare earth oxides had been identified in Rajasthan and Gujarat in western India.

Following on a preliminary agreement on critical minerals that Japan and India signed last year, Tokyo has expressed interest in the Rajasthan deposits and plans to send experts to the site, said the people, who are directly involved in the decision-making. They declined to be named as the deliberations were not public. They did not say when those experts were due to arrive.

In Rajasthan, the Japanese

government would be looking to provide technology for extraction as well as funding in exchange for a stable offtake of rare earths to be taken to Japan, the people said, adding that hard rock deposits required extraction techniques that India does not have currently.

India's ministry of mines and the Japanese embassy did not respond to Reuters emails seeking comment.

Japan is examining mining projects worldwide to diversify mineral supplies, including rare earths, Naoki Kobayashi, deputy director at Japan's ministry of economy, trade and industry, told Reuters.

However, Kobayashi denied any discussion on specific corporate partnerships or technology provision in Rajasthan.

Like Japan, India also wants to cut dependence on Chinese imports. Rare earths are essential for permanent magnets—used in electric vehicle motors, wind turbines, fighter jets and drones—critical for India.

Farm, construction equipment face major emission overhaul

NEW DELHI: The Centre has proposed new emission standards for tractors, harvesters, power tillers and construction equipment.

The ministry of road transport and highways (MoRTH) proposed tightening Rule 115A of the Central Motor Vehicles Rules, 1989, by introducing TREM Stage V (Tractor Emission Stage V) norms for agricultural machinery and strengthening CEV Stage V (Construction Equipment Vehicle Stage V) standards for construction equipment through a draft notification issued on Friday. The public can submit comments to the draft in the next 30 days.

In the tractor engine segment between 56 to 560 kilowatts, particulate matter limits will be cut by 40%, from October 1, 2026. For the first time, manufacturers in this segment will also have to control not just the weight of particles emitted but the number of particles released, a move that effectively pushes companies

towards advanced emission control technologies.

The 37-56 kW category will see a similar 40% tightening, though with a longer runway. These engines will shift to the stricter limit from April 1, 2032.

The most dramatic change is proposed for smaller tractors in the 19-37 kW range. This segment will first move to an intermediate standard in 2028 and then, by April 1, 2032, shift to Stage V limits. Between the current and final stage, particulate emissions in this category are set to fall by nearly 96%, marking one of the steepest reductions across segments.

Higher-powered engines above 560 kW will also come under Stage V norms from Octo-

ber 1, 2026, bringing them into a tighter regulatory net.

"The draft TREM regulations take India part of the way toward global emission standards but stop short where it matters most. While tractors below 25 hp (horsepower) and above 75 hp will move to TREM V by 2026, matching the EU and surpassing the US, the 25 to 50 hp segment, which makes up half the domestic market, will remain on outdated norms until 2032," said Aravind Harikumar, who leads off-road decarbonisation research in India for The International Council on Clean Transportation.

He added, "This delay means India will continue allowing tractors that emit 20 to 40 times more particulate matter than those sold in the US and EU. Even the interim TREM IIIA standard proposed for 2028 still permits particulate matter levels about 20 times higher than TREM V. This risks locking in highly polluting tractors for the next decade and undermining gains from cleaner vehicles and fuels elsewhere."



Apple debuts more M5 chips with MacBook Pro

NEW DELHI: Apple's week of product announcements shifted focus to Apple Silicon on Tuesday, with the debut of the M5 Pro and M5 Max chips in the new 14-inch and 16-inch MacBook Pro models. The MacBook Air has also got a generational refresh with the M5 chip, bringing the latest silicon across Apple's mainstream laptop lineup.

The M5 Pro and M5 Max chips introduce what the tech giant calls a Fusion Architecture, which combines two dies into a single system-on-a-chip. This enables higher bandwidth and lower latency, while integrating a new CPU, a scalable graphics chip, a neural engine and unified memory. The chips will feature architectural similarities, such as an 18-core CPU with six super cores and 12 all-new performance cores, though in different

states of tune.

Apple says the M5 Pro chip gets an up to 18-core CPU with an up to 20-core GPU, with a Neural Accelerator in each core for AI compute. This has four additional CPU cores compared to M4 Pro, which means an up to 30% performance boost. The M5

Max gets an up to 40-core GPU, supporting up to 128GB of unified memory, and the new CPU architecture is up to 15% faster than the M4 Max.

The Apple MacBook Air with M5 (not to be confused with the M5 Pro or M5 Max) succeeds the M4, with improvements includ-

ing double the starting storage capacity at 512GB, faster SSD performance, and Apple's N1 wireless chip with Wi-Fi 7 support. The MacBook Air will be available in 13-inch and 15-inch models.

The 13-inch MacBook Air with M5 will be priced ₹1,19,900

onwards while the 15-inch MacBook Air with M5 will cost ₹1,44,900 onwards.

The 14-inch MacBook Pro and the 16-inch MacBook Pro now offer the choice of the M5 Pro and M5 Max chips, alongside the already available M5 option. Here too, base storage has been doubled, with the M5 Pro machines configured with at least 1TB storage and the M5 Max arriving with at least 2TB storage—much like the MacBook Air with M5's faster SSD upgrade, the MacBook Pro with M5 Pro and M5 Max will also get 2x faster SSD. Apple says these MacBook Pro iterations deliver up to 24 hours of battery life.

In India, the 14-inch MacBook Pro with M5 Pro starts at ₹2,49,900, while iterations with the M5 Max chip start at ₹3,99,900. The 16-inch MacBook Pro with M5 Pro is priced at ₹2,99,900, while the same screen size with the M5 Max chip will cost at least ₹4,29,900.

KOLKATA: They have been here, but not done that. Two sides long defined by composure, adaptability and, at times, heartbreak, now stand one game away from another shot at the ultimate prize. Look up South Africa and New Zealand's history to understand the fickleness and cruelty of sport. They don't complain though. They keep trying.
This semi-final is about learning from the past and exorcising the ghosts and pains of not being able to go all the way. Expect athleticism, sublime catching and smart cricket. If tournaments are about peaking at the right time, both teams have arrived here by different but equally compelling routes. Unbeaten, tactically supreme, South Africa have impressed by resisting the urge to play one-dimensional, high-risk T20 cricket. Instead, they've blended strategy with bursts of power, a template that has served them well in pressure games.
Aiden Markram's leadership has been central. His batting previously focused on anchoring the middle overs against spin but now he has reinvented his cricket by attacking the bowlers in the Powerplay itself.
After him, South Africa have deployed the trio of hitters—Dewald Brevis, David Miller and Tristan Stubbs—with defined roles—to counter spin, pace and to finish—and a high success rate. But their real edge may lie with the ball.
South Africa's pace unit has been tactically outstanding, relying on a hefty variation of wide yorkers, good lengths and smart field placements. They have staggered their strike bowlers rather than front-loading them. The ability to hold back overs for match-ups has also repeatedly stalled opposition surges.
The question for South Africa is familiar: can they sustain clarity under knockout pressure? History

can potentially move on. So again, we're here now, which is ideal. But again, we know we've got a challenge tomorrow against a very good team."
With the ball, New Zealand lean heavily on control and disciplined seam movement. But they have also unusually relied on Santner too much in the middle overs. If fast bowler Matt Henry isn't cleared to play—he is landing Tuesday night after a brief visit home for the birth of his second child—New Zealand may bring back Jacob Duffy.
On the batting front, New Zealand's Powerplay numbers might not always be explosive, but they are efficient. There could be a temptation to bring Glen Phillips up the order, considering the small boundaries at Eden Gardens. Where New Zealand might run into trouble though is the death overs, where Corbin Bosch averages 6.25 runs per over.
"It's not the easiest role nowadays, owning the death overs," said Markram. "But he, at least from a mindset point of view, really wants it and has been wanting it for a while. And I think now the numbers are showing and it's been a massive play for us."
South Africa have often carried the narrative of near-misses in ICC events. But this group appears insulated from that noise. New Zealand, meanwhile, have turned knockout resilience into identity. They are comfortable being underdogs. In many ways, this semi-final represents modern T20 at its most evolved: data-informed, role-driven, emotionally measured.
South Africa bring sharpened aggression and belief. New Zealand bring composure and tournament nous. One team will leave with another story of resilience.

Sen topples world No.1 Shi Yu Qi in a thriller

NEW DELHI: Lakshya Sen has his days: ordinary and incredible. On his ordinary game days, he can lose in the most unexpected fashion, leaving everyone to brood over his talent. Then there are days against fancied opponents, on bigger stages, when he demonstrates his class, shows what he can achieve at world level. On such days, Lakshya the competitor is simply at a different level. He dives, retrieves, smashes, deceives, controls the net, and puts the pressure back on his opponent with every shot. He is a bundle of energy on the court.
In the first round of the All England Open in Birmingham on Tuesday, Lakshya produced one such show for the ages, taking out world No.1 and defending champion Shi Yu Qi 23-21, 19-21, 21-17, causing the biggest upset of the tournament on the very first day.
The high-quality contest lasted 78 minutes, but it seemed the two clashed longer, pushing each other, stretching their limits, trying to outmanoeuvre and searching for the slightest of opening to kill. It was intense and physically draining. Lakshya is a treat to watch in such contests. He can keep you on the edge forever, still surprise his rival with his burst at the end, the way he did against the world champion in the decider. Their head-to-head is 2-4 now.
Leading 11-10 in the tense decider, Lakshya stepped up brilliantly, winning points in heaps. At that point, Shi Yu Qi's levels dipped for the first time in the contest. He hurried through his shots under the relentless pressure he was put in. Lakshya sensed the desperation and punched back with more power in his smashes, more belief in his abilities. He was striking the shuttle from every corner of the court. Shi Yu Qi had no answers. He had given up against an opponent who was simply a notch better than him. Lakshya raced through the final few points, and as Shi Yu Qi's shuttle went long, he simply stood there for a moment facing his coaches, relieved to have

tamed the toughest opponent he could have drawn first up.
The swift end was in contrast to the tantalisingly close first two games. Every point was tightly contested. Coming on the back of four successive wins against Lakshya, Shi must have fancied his chances. But he must have been wary of how tricky Lakshya could be when he gets going.
For Lakshya, it was about playing patiently and constructing points. He started well, taking a 11-7 lead. Keeping the length tight and mixing his shots, Lakshya was not allowing Shi Yu Qi to go for his smashes. It was controlled aggression, and Lakshya would go for the kill when he sensed an opportunity. He was equally brilliant in net dribbles. Shi Yu Qi fought back as Lakshya showed nerves in closing out the first game which he led 18-12. Shi Yu Qi made it 18-16 and saved four match points before Lakshya took the lead after some sensational rallies.
Shi Yu Qi rallied, injecting pace and precision in his strokes in the next game. He was cruising 13-9 when Lakshya staged a dramatic comeback but lost. In the decider, it all came down to who could control their nerves better.
"I had to be patient throughout, and keep changing my tactics now and then. Once he starts reading the game you have to change a little bit," Lakshya said after the win.
Lakshya entered the match prepared for the closing stages.
"I have been through same situations a couple of times, when I lost really close matches (to Shi), but today I pulled it off. Net was crucial to get a good lift. There was not a lot of easy points, so I had to wait for my chances to hit. The only thing I prepared for was the closing stages. If I rush a little bit he has the experience to finish off close games. The last few matches I lost like that."
Lakshya loves the stage. He reached the 2022 All England final. Those were his initial days in the big league when he would cause big upsets in major tournaments, but he has not been able to consistently deliver on that promise. Beating Shi will give him confidence as he faces Hong Kong's Angus KL Ng in the Round of 16 on Thursday. The first-day slaying of the defending champion has presented Lakshya with great possibilities. The important thing for him will be to produce his incredible days more often.

Facing the form question: A greenhorn and a veteran

Abhishek and Buttler, two mavericks at different stages of the careers, are searching for runs in this WC

MUMBAI: Abhishek Sharma will be playing his first ICC World Cup semi-final on Thursday. Jos Buttler will walk out as a seven-time T20 World Cup veteran. Both batters usually deal in the same currency – fours and sixes – but they are enduring nervy times at the moment.

How liberating it must feel to have the licence to thrill, Buttler might think of his younger self watching Abhishek. Surely, it must help more to have been there and done that, Abhishek may be thinking.

These are stray thoughts that run through your mind when runs are not coming. One half of the opening duo of the two semi-finalists is searching for ways to iron out creases from their game.

Abhishek has managed only 80 runs in 6 innings with 55 of them coming in one match against Zimbabwe. But as his scratchy stay at the crease in the previous match against West Indies showed, the left-hander is nowhere near where he wants to be.

Buttler has been doing worse. His 7 innings have lasted only 58 balls and produced 62 runs in all. He may have seen several blips in form over a career spanning 154 T20Is, but at 35, it might be getting harder to continue believing that runs are just around the corner.

The silver lining is that it does not take much for a swing in fortune in T20 cricket.

"Form sometimes is just an innings away," said Sunil Gavaskar in a media interaction ahead of the DP World Celebrity Golf Event to create awareness on the Champs Foundation. "We have seen it with two players in the last month and a half. Suryakumar Yadav and Sanju Samson.

In the New Zealand bilateral series, there were concerns around Suryakumar Yadav's form. Surya kept on saying he is not out of form but out of runs. Then, he started getting runs. Similarly with Sanju. Hopefully for India, Abhishek will be able to be back at his blistering best in the coming matches."

Sunny's views

Gavaskar has kept abreast of the younger format as a commentary regular. His advice to Abhishek is not to be obsessed with being in overdrive mode.

"Don't always look to bat in the fourth gear. Maybe up the gears as you settle in," he said. "Yes, you certainly want to take advantage of the Powerplay. Play to your strengths, but you can do it even batting in the third gear, as Sanju showed by getting 97 off 50 deliveries. Anyone doing that would have ensured his team gets double the runs. 190-200 in the semis and you are possibly looking at a winning score."

Abhishek's five previous dismissals have either come against spin or from failing to read slower balls bowled by pacers.

"In this format, spinners can

give you a feel that you have to go for maximums. You can mis-time and get out. In any case in this format, off-pace deliveries are difficult. Batters like the pace on the ball, to get under the ball and use the pace. With spinners, you have to power the ball and sometimes the bat speed is too much, leading to caught dismissals," said Gavaskar.

England are expected to use off-spinner Will Jacks prominently against Abhishek. But that won't be as easy now with Samson's presence, the back-in-form right-hander.

"Maybe the right-handers have to do more of the batting against Jacks because he is on a roll with the ball," said the batting legend. This tactical cat and mouse between the two sides could prove to be a key factor in the contest. As with Buttler, England continue to believe.

"Jos obviously would want some more runs, but I would certainly like him in my team rather than coming up against him on Thursday," Sam Curran told reporters on Tuesday.

"He's a quality player. He has done well on this ground many many times. Hopefully, Thursday night is his night. We are not worried about him at all."

India delay training by an hour due to lunar eclipse

MUMBAI: The Indian team delayed their evening practice session by an hour, waiting for a lunar eclipse to pass.

According to Hindu belief, an eclipse is considered inauspicious and it seemed the Indian team did not want any bad omen for their World Cup campaign ahead of their semi-final against England at the Wankhede Stadium on Thursday.

Floodlights at the Wankhede Stadium were switched on closer to 7pm, after the eclipse had concluded, by which time players started trooping in for the nets session.

The T20 World Cup co-hosts were earlier supposed to train in the evening slot of 6 to 9pm.

Some members of the support staff had arrived on the field before the players and a few coaches but the action started after some delay.

In fact, even the floodlights of the stadium were turned on around 6:50pm but not at full intensity, which was done moments before the rest of the team took the field.

India are unlikely to make any changes to their playing

Samson, Archer and the short ball battle

MUMBAI: Sanju Samson is facing the first ball of the fifth India-England T20I, after England's short balls caused him to be caught in the deep four times in a row. We are going back fourteen months. The venue is the Wankhede Stadium, the last time these two opponents faced each other in a T20I. Samson is up against Jofra Archer, who has already dismissed him thrice in the series in the same fashion.

How does Samson react? He moves wide outside his off-stump to make room, his back leg way across, front leg in line with the off-stump and pulls Archer for a six in front of square leg. Archer follows him, but Samson repeats the dose, this time behind square leg. Then he cuts him over third man for four. This exchange between two equals faded from memory once Mark Wood's pace hurried Samson in the next over, leading to him holing out to square leg.

Samson's five dismissals facing bouncers became the lasting impression of his battles against England. Archer, a fast bowler whom Samson once captained in the IPL was the wrecker in chief. Come Thursday, as the succeeding chapter plays out, Samson will look to change the outcome.

Between then and now, Samson's world has undergone a whirlwind of change. From being pushed down the order and losing his place due to another pattern of dismissals - being caught in front of square, often in the circle - the batting hero has returned to his confident best with a career-best showing in the knock against the West Indies.

Samson rated his unbeaten 97 in Kolkata higher than his three T20I hundreds and it wasn't only because of the stage. That the high-on-intent batter could unravel layers of his game, not often seen, where he played offensive strokes without high risks - all while adjusting his playing tempo when he lost batting partners and saw the team home - made it a special knock.

After his Man of the Match performance, Samson reiterated that he had no plans to change his much-dissected backfoot trigger, a technique that brought him all the runs, although there were also occasions when he alternated by standing still to face the seamers.

What Samson rediscovered in his last innings was balance in strokeplay. This came with a minute technical switch from his previous struggles: being a fraction early with his backfoot trigger, allowing him time to transfer weight forward when required.


"I wouldn't want to go into the details, but yes, we did work on his initial (movement) a little," said Indian batting coach Sitanshu Kotak.

"We were just trying to create a better base for him. He also felt he was getting ready a little early, and that helped him."

"Some have called it the floating (front) foot, delaying the landing of that is what enables great players to do what they do. But, to do that, you need to have your weight on the back foot which helps to stay stable. So, ensuring it's already loaded and ready isn't a bad way to ensure you delay your front foot landing which allows you to play late," explained Zubin Bharucha, a batting coach who has worked closely with Samson.

When they last faced off, Archer attacked Samson with high pace at lengths shorter than 8m for more than 70% of the time according to ball-by-ball data. Thrice Samson holed out to the two waiting fielders at deep square and once to mid-on. On other occasions, Mark Wood and Saquib Mahmood got him out while pulling.

In Tuesday afternoon nets, Archer was letting the short ones rip. If the Wankhede surface plays true to reputation, there is



merit in trying the short ball play, all over again. The caveat is that if the batter finds the answers, the results could flip to the delight of the home crowd. Samson gave no extra attention to tackling short balls in the evening nets. Instead, he was happy perfecting his foot movements against Mohammed Siraj and Arshdeep Singh, simulating what he may encounter from the likes of Archer, Jamie Overton and Sam Curran.

"It will depend on the game situation, but Sanju will probably have no option but to take him on," said Bharucha of the impending Archer-Samson clash. "There could be a few adaptations along the way like the upper cut or leaving a few, but also knowing it's a small ground it might be prudent at various junctures to take it on depending on the angle you pick it up from."

For the packed house anticipating a blockbuster semi-final, watching England's quickest pacer challenge India's batting darling will be a mouth-watering prospect to look forward to.

England have a better spin attack than India. Varun has been got at. Dawson, Rashid and Will Jacks have been the best spin trio in the tournament.

All-rounders Jacks, Curran hold the key for England

MUMBAI: England's Will Jacks has a tough role as an all-rounder. He is not among their first-choice batters or frontline bowlers, but showing great character he is making vital contributions with both bat and ball to make a difference to his team at this World Cup.

Jacks has repeatedly dug England out of tricky situations, contributing 191 runs batting in the finisher's role at No 7. In the Super Eights, he delivered in the big games for nerve-jangling wins over Sri Lanka, Pakistan and New Zealand. Filling the duties of the extra bowler behind the frontline five, he has chipped in with useful breakthroughs claiming seven wickets with his off-spin. Four Man of the Match awards underline his value to his side.

In Thursday's semi-final against India at the Wankhede Stadium, England will be banking on their spin all-rounder to make an impact. "Will's been amazing, it's such a different role for him than

what he's used to I guess, scoring vital runs at number seven and bowling some very tough overs and taking many wickets," his teammate Sam Curran said on Tuesday at the Wankhede.

Jacks' best show has been against New Zealand. After finishing with figures of 4-0-23-2 - his wickets included the in-form Finn Allen and Glenn Phillips - he came and hit an 18-ball 32 not out at No 7. In a chase of 160, England needed 43 off the final 18 deliveries,

and Jacks shared an unbroken, match-winning stand of 44 from 16 balls with debutant Rehan Ahmed. Against Sri Lanka, he claimed three wickets in the powerplay for figures of 4-0-22-3 for another man of the match performance. In the big semi-final against the hosts and defending champions, Jacks' role is also important for England because he is well-versed with the conditions at the Wankhede, being a regular MI player last season.

AFC Women's Asian Cup: Uncertainty over kits end one day before India-Vietnam game

KOLKATA: It was boots before the 2022 under-17 World Cup. In Perth, it was about match day kits for the senior team. Milestone moments for the women's football teams have had the All India Football Federation (AIFF) caught off-side. Twice.

The uncertainty over match kits for the AFC Women's Asian Cup had not ended when head coach Amelia Valverde and skipper Sweety Devi were addressing the media in Perth one day before their first game in group C, against Vietnam.

The okay from the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) to kits procured from a local supplier came after that. Cancelled earlier, the official photoshoot could happen only on Tuesday.

On Monday morning, the players received kits that "appear to have been manufactured for the under-15 or smaller athletes and do not fit at least 80% of the 26-player

squad," members of the India's squad said in a letter to the AIFF. HT has seen the letter.

"Over the past days, players and staff have already faced challenges due to the lack of appropriate clothing during preparation. The arrival of incorrect match kits at this crucial stage has further affected morale and disrupted our focus in the final days leading up to the match," the players wrote in a signed statement to the AIFF deputy secretary-general Satyanarayan Muthyalu.

AIFF swung into action after that and sourced kits from a European company with outlets in Perth. Working through the night, the kits were ready on Tuesday, said an AIFF official on Tuesday.

The practice kits India are using are from the old supplier whose contract ended last December, the official said. Not authorised to speak to the media, the official requested anonymity. Training in Türkiye and Aus-

tralia since January 15, India played seven club friendlies in jerseys of that supplier, the official said. This was after AIFF's tender for a new kit manufacturer fetched no bids. AIFF asked two other former suppliers but talks reached a dead end, said a second official who also did not want to be named.

"An AIFF staff then went to Tirupur (in Tamil Nadu) and found a manufacturer who was ready to provide the kits," said the second official explaining the delay. Ill-fitting shirts then provided a twist to the tale.

In 2022, new boots for India's under-17 team reached after their final practice session, the delay attributed to the consignment being set by road.

On the football front, with one key player out injured and another joining last week, India hope to live down memories of the last edition and stay in the hunt for a 2027 World Cup berth. "In life there are no coincidences, so we are back to prove ourselves again," said

head coach Amelia Valverde at Tuesday's pre-match media conference in Perth. Valverde was replying to whether the players would try to redeem themselves after being scratched from the last edition in 2022, which India had hosted, because of a Covid-19 outbreak. Eight players in Australia including skipper Sweety Devi were part of that side.

In a separate message to HT, Valverde said that having qualified for the first time on merit, she told the players that "the occasion should not be bigger than our preparation. If we focus on our responsibilities and our identity as a team, then the tournament becomes an opportunity, not something overwhelming."

Japan and Chinese Taipei are also in India's group. Former world and Asian champions Japan start every tournament as one of the favourites and Chinese Taipei came close to World Cup qualification in 2022, she said.



Balam Pichkari not a Holi song originally, reveals Pritam

It features on every Holi playlist, blaring from speakers around festivities. But composer Pritam has revealed that *Balam Pichkari* from *Yeh Jawaani Hai Deewani* (2013) was not originally conceived as a Holi track. "Initially, it was not going to be a Holi song," the 54-year-old says, adding that the change happened after director Ayan Mukerji attended a Holi celebration in 2012. "(Ayan) told us, 'We have to set this song during Holi. It'll take the vibe to another level,'" he says. Over a decade later, Pritam is grateful for the love the song has

received. "*Balam Pichkari* trends at the top almost every Holi," he says, adding, "If I knew exactly what made it cut across generations, I would probably try to recreate it every time. But honestly, it's impossible to predict these things." Nowadays, he feels that there is a seeming lull in iconic festival tracks. But Pritam insists, "There is always space for a good song. Platforms may change, listening habits may evolve, but emotions don't."

Celebration is resistance, not cruelty: Mandana Karimi on Khamenei's death

Amid the US-Iran war, Irani actor-activist Mandana Karimi has reaffirmed her fierce opposition to the country's ruling establishment, following the death of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. "No one celebrates innocent loss of life. But you cannot ask a nation that has endured decades of executions, imprisonment, torture, and mass crackdowns to react with conventional mourning," she says, adding that for many Iranians, "Celebration has become a form of resistance and a way to reclaim power over grief." Addressing accusations that such reactions amount to endorsing foreign military intervention, she responds: "This was not a random foreign agenda imposed on us. No one wants bombs in their country, but when all internal paths to reform are blocked, people begin to look outward." Mandana, 37, adds how Irani citizens are now calling for political activist Reza Pahlavi as their leader. "The chants of Javid Shah (Long live the king, a slogan opposing the Irani government) did not start abroad... they started inside Iran. We see Pahlavi as a transitional alternative capable of uniting the country."

ESHA GUPTA, PV SINDHU ARE NOW BACK HOME
Actor Esha Gupta and shuttler PV Sindhu, who were stranded in the UAE amid the air travel shutdown, shared respective updates about being "back home". Esha wrote, "I saw the strength of UAE... Thank you to our government for bringing the citizens home. Thank you to UAE government for working in solidarity with every country." Meanwhile, Sindhu wrote: "A heartfelt thank you to the incredible ground teams, Dubai authorities, airport staff, immigration, and every single person who stepped up and took such good care of us during a very difficult time." She had to pull out of the All England Open Badminton Championships 2026 due to the Dubai ordeal.




To travel vlogger Anali Gupta, it felt like a scene straight out of Zindagi Na Milegi Dobara (2011). "Between the smell of squashed tomatoes, coughing, almost throwing up, and even being smacked in the eye while filming, it was totally

intense," she shares. Said to be the world's biggest food fight, this festival remains on the bucket list of many Indians. Travel creator Waqar Azmi, informs that every third or fourth person there was Indian. "The crowd began singing Jhumma Chumma, and it felt like I was back in India," he shares.



Battle of the Oranges, Italy

This takes place during the Carnival of Ivrea, held every year in February. It is a three-day festival to commemorate the history of the Ivrean people's liberation. During the festival, teams on foot take

on helmeted riders in horse-drawn carts. Experiencing it, travel creator Devesh More quips, "The oranges seemed so fresh that I was confused whether they were meant to be thrown at people. I even took a little bite of some."



Songkran, Thailand

During this festival, all of Bangkok, Phuket and Chiang Mai transform into water combat zones annually in April, marking the Thai New Year. "While walking on the street, I suddenly saw groups of people playing with water guns. Within minutes, someone splashed me, someone else handed me a water gun, and I knew this wasn't a festival you just watch," shares travel creator Anu Sai Meena. "There were unspoken rules: no pushing, no shoving, no forcing anyone. The streets shut down, and DJs played on moving trucks. But the moment the festival ends, everything goes back to being spotless," she adds.

Boryeong Mud Festival, South Korea

Held annually from late July to early August at Daecheon Beach, Boryeong, this is Holi's dirtier sibling in the best way. The mud in Boryeong is rich in minerals, and Koreans celebrate that by turning it into a playful paradise. The festival includes mud baths, slides, wrestling, foam parties, water fights,

and concerts. Travel creator Maansi Arora says, "There were all kinds of challenges like wall climbing, balancing on wooden panels and a bunch of obstacle games. And then getting completely drenched in mud. The setup was like a water park, but instead of water, it was silky grey mud."

Chinchilla Melon Festival, Australia

Celebrating Chinchilla's status as Australia's 'Melon Capital', this festival is biennially held and has evolved into a high-energy community celebration. It features playful, messy, and highly visual activities like melon skiing, melon iron-man races, melon bungee, pip-splitting contests, and melon tossing, making it quite reminiscent of the joyful spirit we see during Holi. The four-day festival attracts over 20,000 visitors, with the next major gathering scheduled for February 2027.

Phagu Poomima, Nepal

Celebrated around the same time as India, the country turns into a living canvas every spring for two days. The Pahadi (hill communities) celebrate it on day 1, while the Terai belt (Southern Nepal), whose celebration reflects similar energy to that of UP and Bihar, celebrate it on day 2. People spill into the streets, colour everyone in sight, dance, making it a community celebration," says Ravi Kumar, a business consultant from Nepal living in Delhi.



Out of colour, Bollywood?

Musicians reflect on the fading frenzy of Holi anthems in films

Singer Udit Narayan, says, "The depiction of our festivals is slowly decreasing in cinema," adding that many stories today are "more practical... about sex and crime," leaving little room for celebratory set-pieces. "If the story doesn't have scope, fitting a Holi song is next to impossible," he adds.



Composer Lalit Pandit, says, "Movies are more action-oriented and gruesome now, so the grandeur of Holi songs has fallen out of favour. Large festival sequences need time, extras and scale that modern shoots rarely allow."

Composer Pritam admits Holi songs are now "few and far between." He says, "Holi songs haven't vanished, but they don't stick. Maybe they're not as grand anymore for an organic connection with the listeners."

From *Rang Barse* to *Jai Jai Shiv Shankar*, Holi songs once came built into Bollywood storytelling. But how many of such Holi anthems can you recall from recent years, barring a few such as *Panwadi* (*Sunny Sanskari ki Tulsi Kumari*, 2025). Listeners and composers both feel we need more Holi anthems. "Holi songs have been few and far between," agrees music composer Pritam behind hits like *Balam Pichkari*.

So what's stopping the makers? Many say stories and budgets have changed. Trade expert Atul Mohan explains, "These days producers know that the revenue coming out of a film's music album is not as big as it used to be 20 years ago. Another reason, makers are making cinema of convenience, they are not willing to take risks or create something which is big on emotion."
